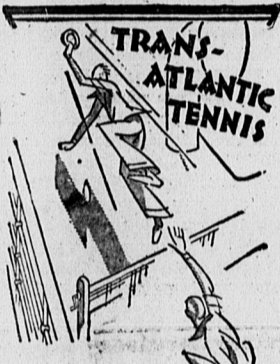

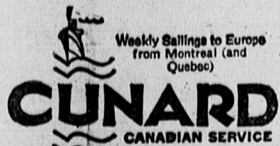

Local Services Of Thanksgiving For King's Recovery

The following telegram speaks for itself:

Quebec, June 23, 1929:
His Honour the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island.

My telegrams of May thirtieth and June third thanking services for His Majesty's recovery. Service will now be held Sunday, July seventh at eleven a. m. Please arrange.

It was at first intended to hold the service earlier, as the following telegram shows, but as His Majesty had taken a slight relapse the service was postponed till the above date.

Ottawa, May 30, 1929.

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island.

His Excellency has received the following telegram from Lord Stamfordham, Private Secretary to His Majesty the King:

"The King has issued no orders but has intimated his intention of attending a Service of Thanksgiving at Westminster Abbey on June sixteenth, and expressed the hope that his people throughout the Empire would join in this act in their own churches."

His Excellency has asked the heads of clergy of Anglican, Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, United and Baptist denominations to comply with His Majesty's wishes and will personally attend service in uniform and hopes you will consider it proper to do the same and suggests that ministers in your province of denominations other than those mentioned above, be informed of service and be invited to join in general thanksgiving.

In compliance with the above suggestions His Honour Lieutenant Governor Hearty will officially attend in uniform as the King's representative, Thanksgiving Service in St. Paul's Church, Charlottetown, at 11 a. m., and Trinity United Church at 7 p. m. on July 7th.

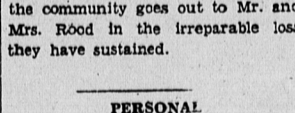
Miss Helen Clements of Everett, Brompton, arrived on the Island Tuesday and will spend the summer visiting friends in York.

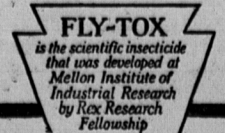
