LEMIEUX'S VISIT TO ROME TO SECURE POPE'S AID

(Continued from page 1.)

master-General to Rome and to the story that was published almost immediately after the latter's return to Canada, that the British authorities and the Laurier Cabinet had approached the Vatican with the object of having the Pope intervene in the naval question in favor of the Laurier government's policy.

This story, Mr. Bourassa says, in credit as it appears, is true. "These steps were taken; they are being pursued at the present time, and it was a Canadian Minister, Mr. Rodolphe Lemieux, from whom the information was obtained by those who published the story.

Mr. Bourassa denounces, in scathing terms such an attempt. "It is a fine spectacle," he says, "to see politicians at bay seeking to enrol the force of his bishops and cardinals in their electoral squads to bolster up their thrones in distress and their empty Rainbows, and above all, to assure to the Ministerial party the conservation of their portfolios, their patronage, their places, etc. in the name of liberty of the Church, and the preservation of the Empire."

"And who are these fierce defenders of the throne?" asked Mr. Bourassa. "They are," he adds, "the annexationists of yesterday, who held their hands behind them in order to receive from an American syndicate the millions destined to pay the expense of a campaign for unrestricted reciprocity, the prelude and screen

to the abandonment of our national franchises and the rights of the Crown to the American Republic.

The same men, Mr. Bourassa further points out, who are now seeking to obtain the support of the Vatican, who are posing as champions of the liberties of the Church, who are seeking to draw the Catholic clergy of Quebec as a body into a contest exclusively political, where faith and religious discipline are in nowise concerned, are these who on former occasions opposed and deceived the Holy See.

Mr. Bourassa, in conclusion, promises that in a subsequent article he will further expose this cynical manoeuvre to put the question upon a religious ground, and how it is sought to hide the game by inventing a "so-called" Nationalist conspiracy in the colleges of Quebec, at the same time denouncing with a well feigned indignation the pretended opposition of the Quebec clergy to the defence of British liberties. "The plot in truth," concludes Mr. Bourassa, "has been well hatched, besides Earl Grey has lent a hand, and he is a master. Unfortunately, they counted without the effectiveness of the good, big Rodolphe. They were wrong to confide such secret and diplomatic missions to him. The long silence of the stars were fatal to him."

Mr. Bourassa's next article will be awarded with the keenest interest in political circles, as his declarations intend to wage an aggressive fight against the manoeuvres of the Laurier Government.

MONCTON AFTER REAL STAR

MONTREAL, Jan. 28.—Maritime province professional hockey has made its first attempt to corner a really and truly senior star. Art Ross out of the professional game at present because he demanded a prohibitive salary early in the year, last evening was in receipt of a message from the management of the Moncton, N. B., team asking him to name his own terms for two games against the Halifax Crescents. Ross will name terms, but they are likely to be higher than anything the Maritime Province promoters have yet paid in from the various salaries. Incidentally it is stated that Ross, recognized as one of the most brilliant defence men of the present day, is just on the point of signing with Wanderers.

315 CASES OF TYPHOID FEVER IN OTTAWA

OTTAWA, Jan. 27.—The medical health officer today made a canvass of the various physicians and reports that there are now 315 cases of typhoid fever in the city. No new deaths have been reported.

BAD FIRE IN MARYSVILLE.

FREDERICTON, Jan. 30.—Marysville was visited by a disastrous fire which did damage to the extent of \$70,000 and which destroyed the handsome Methodist Church, also damaged the house of the Gibson Manufacturing Co.

The church cost \$65,000 and was insured for \$10,000.
