In hats worn with dresses, suits and coats, the profile hats predominate, some rolling upward with ruffled brims, others with brim up on one side and down on the other.

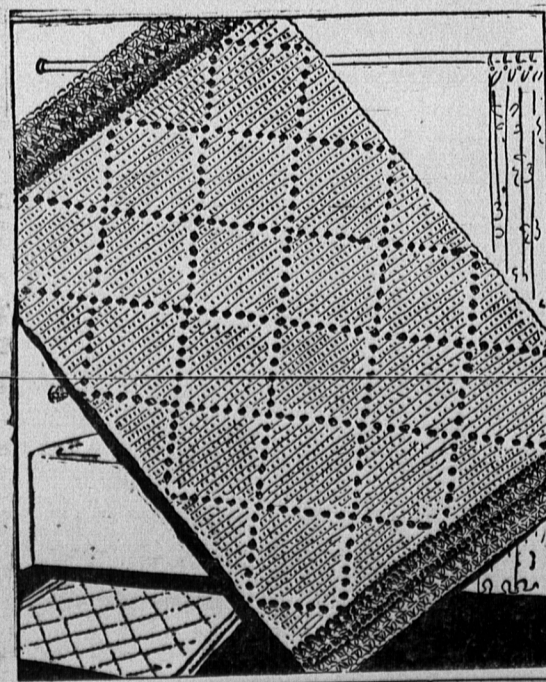
For casual wear are cashmere jerseys in shades of tan, wine, blue, violet, a jockey red, and browns, fullness introduced by pleats and tucks.

Charming Sewing Stand Fun to Make as a Gift



A Plain Cheese Box Is the Base
The kind of useful, attractive gift your best friend will love you for. Yet you make this handy sewing stand easily and cheaply.

A round wooden cheese box (ask your grocer for one) is fine for the upper part. The legs are three pieces of wood 30 inches, high—just a comfortable working height.

Nail the legs at equal distance around the box. Then nail the lid of the cheese box six inches from the bottom, making a handy shelf.

Give the stand a coat of flat white paint and, when it dries, a coat of enamel. Around the box and shell you might paint a simple flower motif, as in our sketch—easily done with stencils and especially charming if it matches the motif in the lining!

This lining, for the inside of the box, may be a cretonne strip, gathered around the top and tacked down the sides to form pockets. The bottom of the box is a padded cardboard circle covered with the same cretonne.

THE COOK'S CORNER

RHUBARB ORANGE MARMALADE

2 pounds rhubarb
2 cups sliced orange
7 cups sugar
4 cups lemon juice
Method: Wash the rhubarb, trim, and slice it into about 1-2-inch lengths. Cut oranges into quarters on eight sides, remove the seeds, and put through the food chopper, using a fine blade. Combine the rhubarb, chopped oranges, lemon juice, well-drained pineapple, water and sugar. Let stand in preserving kettle for about 10 minutes.

Now place over heat and stir to combine. Add the sugar, then bring to a boil and keep boiling gently for about 30 minutes, stirring frequently. Just before removing from the fire, stir in the almond. Pour into hot, sterilized jars, and seal with melted paraffin. Cover the jars and store in a cool, dry place.

PINK MARMALADE

6 cups red rhubarb
2 lemons, juice and grated rind
1 cup crushed pineapple
4 cups sugar
Method: Wash, trim, and cut rhubarb into short lengths, then measure it. Grate the rind from the lemons and squeeze out the juice. Drain the crushed pineapple well. Combine the rhubarb, lemon rind and juice and the crushed pineapple, and mix in the sugar. Place over a low fire and stir until the sugar is dissolved, then boil gently until the mixture is thick and clear. Pour into hot, sterilized jars and seal with melted paraffin. Store in a cool, dry place.

SPIDERS IN WAR

For fifty-two years Miss Mary Pettifit has been relieving spiders of their fibre to make cross hairs for range-finders and bomb-sights. Each summer she sends youngsters into the fields and barns to find spiders. Miss Pettifit seizes the spiders with tweezers, flings them into the air and the spider so thrown starts spinning and continues until it lands.

As a rule all but the late-blooming perennials, such as anemones, asters and chrysanthemums, may be moved with great ease and success in the autumn as long as the ground remains in good condition.

6 cups rhubarb
1 orange
4 tablespoons lemon juice
1 cup crushed pineapple
1-2 cup water
