\$42.00 Average Price For Pelts At Mt'l. Auction

(Special to the Guardian) MONCTON, N. B., Dec. 17.—Price of fox pelts registered an advance of from 25 to 30 per cent at the fur auction held in Montreal during the week, declared George Curback, President of the Canadian National Live Silver Fox Breeders Association who was a passenger on the Maritime Express of the Canadian National Railways this (Saturday) morning en route from Montreal where he attended the fur auction to his home in Summerside, P. E. I.

There were more pelts put up for auction in Montreal than were placed on the London, Eng. market at the auction held there about the same time, he stated. Pelts handled by the Association which represents fox breeders throughout Canada he said averaged \$42.00 a piece. The outlook for the pelt market, Mr. Curback continued, is very bright and there is an increased demand for pelts. There were twenty-two European buyers at the Montreal fur auction as well as others from New York, Canadian silver pelts being much in demand by New York buyers as Canadian pelts are considered superior to those produced by United States breeders.

Montreal is now one of the world's greatest fur auction centres and doubtless will continue to increase in prestige in this respect. The next fur auction in Montreal opens January 9th.

MAROONS LOSE TO CANUCKS 3-1

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Dec. 18.—It was bitter medicine Maroons' fans had to swallow Saturday night when Canadiens, Montreal's other National Hockey League entry, humbled the big red team 3-1 and sent them toppling from the leadership of the Canadian section. Toronto Leafs passed Maroons to take first place with a smart win over Detroit.

The speeding Canadiens seemed to have struck their stride at last. They are now undefeated in three starts, having beaten Ottawa, tied Rangers and defeated Maroons within eight days.

The Maroons, dropping their first game in seven starts, simply could not cope with the speed and brilliance of the "Flying Frenchmen." Newsy Lalonde's red raiders peppered the Maroon ottdel with a heavy bombardment through all 3 periods. Maroons had the edge only for the first few minutes of the second period when George Hainsworth rose to the occasion with some magnificent goal tending.

To Appeal From A Decision Re Freight Rates

KENTVILLE, N. S., Dec. 18.—(By The Canadian Press)—The executive of the Nova Scotia Shippers' Association under president H. O. Bishop will meet here tomorrow to plan an appeal from a decision of the Board of Railway Commissioners which would add 15 cents to the freight rate on a barrel of apples from the Annapolis Valley to Halifax.

The present rate is 13 cents. A previous ruling had set forth that railways coming under the provisions of the Maritime Freight Rates Act would be entitled to reimbursement when rates established under the Act were further reduced in efforts to aid the industry. This had been reversed, on the ground that wording of the Act will not permit such action, although the "intent" was there, no legal right had been given.

Efforts will be made by the shippers' association to reach some plan whereby the new ruling may be circumvented. It would raise the rate to 28 cents a barrel.
