EX-JUDGE DEWEY UNDER RESTRAINT.

BOSTON, Feb. 1.—Ex-Judge Henry S. Dewey, one of the most familiar figures in this city, was taken into custody as an insane person at the courthouse yesterday and taken to Pierce Farm.

He stubbornly resisted arrest, but the officers overpowered him and put him into a taxicab and he was driven to the West Roxbury institution. The arrest was made on a warrant issued by Judge Grant of the probate court, on complaint of Charles Gaynor, institution registrar of the city of Boston, who sets forth allegations relating to the insanity of the former justice of the Municipal Court.

Judge Dewey will be placed in the psychopathic ward of the hospital for observation. This course was taken in view of the actions of Judge Dewey in the past few years, more notably his appearing to try a case in the superior criminal court last week in his uniform of brigadier general of the militia, carrying a sword and revolver. An investigation at the time showed the revolver was not loaded, but the mere fact that he had a revolver caused some commotion at the courthouse.

GOLD BOOM REPORTED FAKE.

WINNIPEG, Man., Feb. 1.—The Manitoba provincial police are investigating a number of suspects in the abortive Manitowish placer gold boom. It is said that an organized scheme to make a big killing was afoot, only frustrated by the prompt visit of California mining experts who pricked the bubble. Prosecutions may be instituted.

TORONTO, Ont., Feb. 1.—Three thousand representative Toronto men and women raised their hands in unison last night to express opposition to any civic enactment closing the public toboggan slides on Sunday. The demonstration of opinion came at the end of an enthusiastic meeting in Massey Hall.

With the exception of one sensational disturbance created by a female street preacher, in the middle of Mr. Smith's address, the meeting was the most orderly of the sort seen in Toronto for years.

TACKLES A BURGLAR SHOT IN THE BREAST

BERLIN, Ont., Feb. 2.—Melvin Yost a photographer, was shot in the right breast early Tuesday morning and is in serious condition. Yost was on his way home when he saw two men breaking into the factory of the Berlin Tool Works. One man entered the building while his confederate remained on the street. Yost rushed up and grabbed the man on the street, and in a scuffle which ensued he was shot in the breast.

Though in a semi-conscious condition Yost succeeded in walking to the surgery of a doctor a short distance from the scene of the shooting and the bullet was extracted, after which he was removed to an hospital. The shooting attracted the attention of the police who immediately set out on the trail of the two burglars, who were running along the Preston road when last seen.

FROM "BEAUTY PARLOR" TO INSANE ASYLUM.

BERLIN, Feb. 2.—A mad craving to become beautiful at all costs has resulted in a Berlin noblewoman, the wife of an officer, having to be taken to an insane asylum, and a woman who induced her to pay \$15,000 for a "sure road to beauty" has been sentenced to two years' imprisonment for fraud.

A middle-aged Silesian woman recently opened a "beauty parlor" in Munich. Hearing of the Berlin noblewoman's passion to correct the deficiencies of which she was a victim at the hands of Mother Nature, the proprietress of the "beauty parlor" sent word that she had a friend, a masseuse, who could administer "cosmetic treatment" which was guaranteed to correct the homeliest features into a pretty face, and the most impossible of figures into a form over which sculptors would rave.

The owner of the "beauty parlor" received \$15,000 in advance, as agreed upon, and proceeded to administer the treatment, but before it had proceeded very far the fraud came to light in time for the police to seize possession of the bulk of the money.

The only effect of the treatment was to mar the noblewoman's face with a distressing rash, while her figure retains its unattractive lines. Her relatives found it desirable to have the unhappy woman placed in an asylum.

EXHIBITION SHOWING WOMAN AT HOME AND IN BUSINESS.

BERLIN, Feb. 2.—Under the patronage of the Kaiserin and the active leadership of Frau Hedwig Heyl, the millionaire society leader known as the "Mother of Berlin" because of her many philanthropic activities, the women of Germany are engaged in preparations for a women's exhibition, which will be called "Women in Home and Business." The exhibition will be opened on February 24 in the great salon at the Zoological Gardens, and will last for six or seven weeks.

It will show the accomplishments of women in every sphere of human activity which she has so far invaded. Music will be provided by a band of lady musicians, who will play, exclusively, compositions written by women. There is to be a library filled only with books whose authors are women, and the exhibition hall will be decorated with paintings made by feminine hands and works by women sculptors. The role women have played in the world's wars, not only as samaritans but as soldiers, will be graphically illustrated.

The organizers promises to astonish "mere man" by the staggering display of feminine accomplishments in those occupations and professions commonly regarded as the monopoly of the sterner sex. Exhibits will be shown to convince the observer that women have invaded permanently and successfully the fields of the manufacture, commerce, banking, law, medicine, journalism, the church, politics, theatre and opera management, to say nothing of the humbler callings wherein women and girls have long competed with men.

Soon after the opening of the exhibition the National Congress of German Women will take place for the purpose of discussing feminine topics of the hour, including the question of the army conscript service for women.

MR. MORGAN THREATENED BY WALL STREET LOSER.

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—A squad of detectives waited in vain last night in Central Park to catch the writer of a threatening letter sent to J. P. Morgan, Jr., demanding that \$10,000 be deposited at a certain spot on the east drive or something serious would happen. It is understood that the letter contained the statement that the writer had lost his money in Wall Street, and that he "considered it up to Mr. Morgan to make restitution."
