Mr. Arsenault who was 33 years of age was a man highly esteemed by all his acquaintances and was an able workman being employed with the same man for several years. Todd and Mrs. Clara Todd, both of Portland, Me. Five brothers and three sisters in O'Leary also survives.—Mrs. Riley was the daughter of John Bernard, Section Foreman, O'Leary. The sad intelligence of her death was a very severe blow to Mr. and Mrs. Bernard, and other members of the family. While aware that their daughter was ill they were under no apprehension that it was at all serious, until the news of her death was received. ## BUSINESS SECTION IN SYDNEY, N.S., BURNED.

—SYDNEY, N.S., May 3.—A loss estimated at \$127,000 was caused by fire which wiped out the greater part of a business section of Charlottetown Street this morning. Three firemen had miraculous escape from death during the conflagration. The firms burned out are: Wright's Limited, furniture, building and stock, \$50,000; Minto Hotel, building and furnishings, \$30,000; George Measures, shoe shine, \$100; Dominion Express, \$500; Ben Williams, barber, \$1,000; Miles Block, J. W. Miles, building and grocery stock, \$25,000; C. W. Kelly, photographer, \$3,000; F. J. Mitchell, building, \$4,000; C. B. Griffin, men's furnishings, \$1,000.

The fire originated in the repair shop of Wright's Limited, and was discovered about 8.20 o'clock. Although the firemen were on the scene and working a few minutes later, the building was a total loss in less than half-an-hour.

## GIRL IS PROMOTED TO BE LIEUTENANT.

—PETROGRAD, May 4.—Army orders contain notice of the promotion of a young woman, Alexandra Lagerey, to lieutenant. With sixteen other girls, belonging to families of Cossacks, she has been fighting alongside her male relatives since the beginning of the war. Eight of the girls have been killed. Lieutenant Lagerey was made a prisoner, but she killed her guard, escaped and led a reconnoitering party, which captured eighteen Hungarians in Suwalki with important documents. The Czar now is motoring through Galicia.

## FRENCH 'COLONEL TO BE 'DRUMMED OUT.'

—PARIS, May 3.—Colonel Francois Desclaux, who was a general paymaster in the French army, and Madame Bechoff, who was a general paymaster in the French army, appealed from the verdict of seven and two years' imprisonment respectively passed on them recently by a court-martial following their conviction on a charge of stealing government stores. The military tribunal yesterday rejected the appeal of Colonel Desclaux and Madame Bechoff, but this time the plea was made to the Court of Cassation, the highest court of appeal, on the ground that accused are civilians and not connected with the military.

The contents of a letter written by Colonel Desclaux before his trial was given out today. It was written to a particular friend, suggesting that he provoke a general amnesty and threatening other persons if he (Desclaux) were not protected.

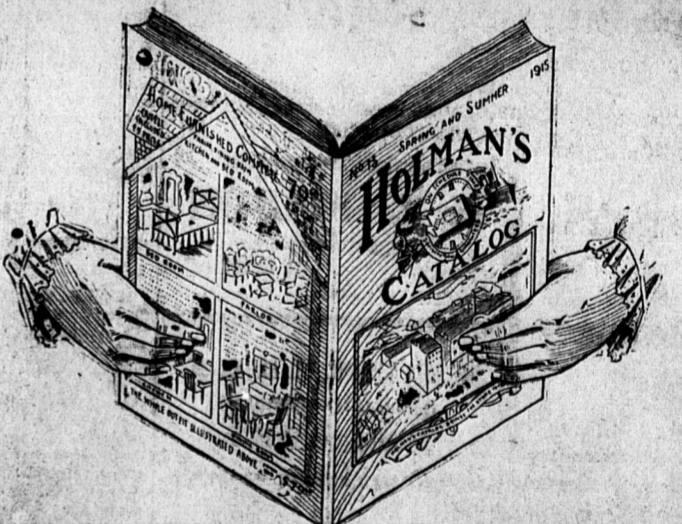
