The candidate looked surprised. "What hat?" he asked. "The one you're talking through."

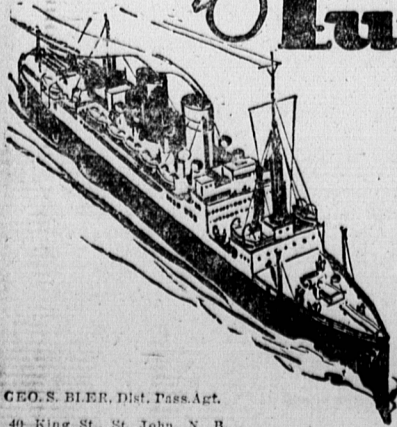
