

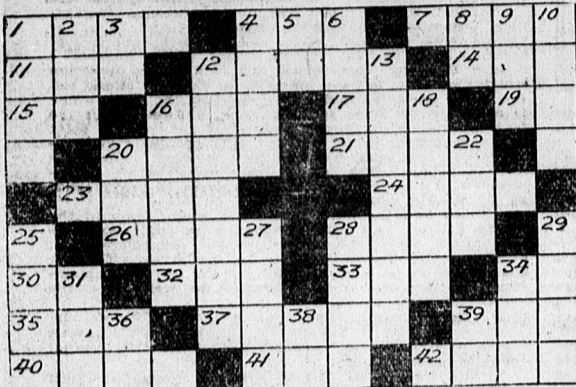

GERMAN LOANS

The German Government is now consulting bankers regarding a new scheme for revaluation of loans, according to the Berlin Correspondent of the Investment House of C. M. Cordasco & Company writing in the February number of their Foreign Exchange Bulletin.

The chief feature of the proposal is that instead of benefiting only original subscribers the new scheme will benefit present holders of the loans.

It is considered in financial circles in Berlin almost beyond doubt that the new government will radically revise the Third Taxation Decree of February, 1924, which professed to regulate this matter definitely.

Advices from Amsterdam indicate that the purchase of German state and municipal securities by the German Government is steadily increasing.

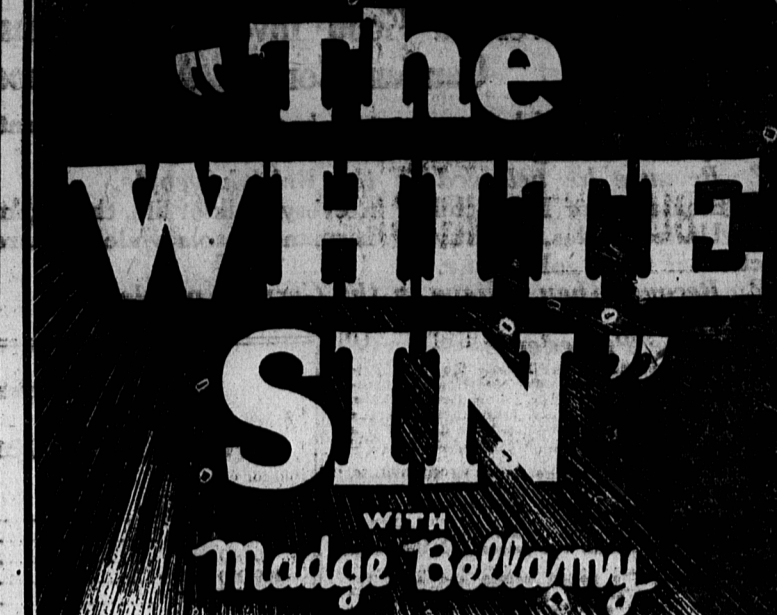
