IN MEMORIAM

MR. HERBERT MONAGHAN.

The death occurred at his home 223 Queen St., on Tuesday the 30th of June of Herbert Monaghan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Monaghan at the early age of 22 years. His death at that early age is very much to be regretted, as he was possessed of exceptionally fine character and gave ample proof of bright intellect. He entered St. Dunstons College last September to prepare himself for a theological course, but was destined not to accomplish his ambition as he became ill last January and gradually sank, despite all the care of a loving mother and friends. His funeral took place last Thursday to the Pro-Cathedral where High Mass was celebrated by the Revd. P. Duffy and Rev. F. McQuaid afterwards officiated at the grave in the R. C. Cemetery.

MR. CHRISTOPHER SMITH.

There passed peacefully to his rest at Whitney Pier, N. S., Christopher Smith in the seventy-fourth year of his age. Though he had been ailing for about a year, yet the end came suddenly and unexpectedly on the evening of Friday, June 12th, 1914. Mr. Smith was a native of Crapaud, P. E. I., and was the son of the late George and Ann Smith of this place. He was a highly respected resident of Whitney Pier, and was for many years a consistent member of the Methodist Church. He leaves to mourn, besides a sorrowing wife, twelve children of whom eleven were by his bedside when the end came. He also leaves three brothers, Henry of Tryon, P. E. I., Prince and Isaac in California, and two sisters, Mrs. Bertron Lee of Vernon River and Mrs. Thomas H. Dault of Montague, P. E. I. The remains were interred in Sydney.

MR. GEORGE GALLANT

Death always inexorable in his harvest reaping young and old, rich and poor alike, disregarding all stages and conditions of life, has reaped another victim in the person of Mr. George Gallant, resident of Rustico. He passed away after a long illness endured with patience and resignation and provided with all the spiritual help of the Catholic Church. The deceased was 84 years of age, and one of the oldest and most respected residents of the place. He leaves to mourn, a widow of an advanced age, a son, Mr. Albert Gallant of the home of the deceased and five daughters, Mrs. Armand LeClair, Mrs. Simon Pineau, Mrs. Leon Gallant and Mrs. Joseph N. Pineau, all of North Rustico, and lastly Mrs. Henry Doucette, of Charlottetown. A large circle of relatives and friends went to pay their respects to the deceased and assisted in large numbers at the funeral which was one of the most largely attended of the year. The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon. Next to the hearse there followed a number of the children and grand-children of the deceased, which is perhaps the highest in number on record in Rustico. AROUND THE FUR RANCHES

A new fox ranch is to be started on the farm of James E. Shaw, Brackley Point Road, Leonard Wood, of Pazelbrook, and others will be interested in this venture.

Letters patent, dated June 29, 1914, have been granted to F. H. Beer, Miller Matheson, Charles Leigh, Clifton H. Beer, Charles E. Morris, Wm. F. Morris, Arthur E. Smith and E. H. Leger to incorporate the Magnet Fur Co., Ltd., with a capital of \$22,000, divided into 3,200 shares of \$10 each.

The spread of the fox breeding industry is reaching an extent hardly calculated upon by those connected with it in its infancy and this development of course is directly traceable to the success which has attended the business in this province, the place of its birth. The industry, which was at one time pretty much confined to Prince Edward Island has crossed over to New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. In New Brunswick, it has taken a very strong hold and new fox companies are being formed there almost every day. The people are becoming very greatly interested. Many of these companies have pinned their faith on "cross-foxes" and companies of that nature and others with low capitalization, no doubt, prove very popular among investors. The name of Oulton seems to be a thing in vogue with in New Brunswick in the fox business and various companies in that province claim to have Oulton stock. The Oultons are directors of or otherwise prominently connected with a good many ranches here. The old Oulton foxes have been sold out to a company of which Messrs. Keirstead and Mercereau are the promoters.

Moncton is the centre of the fox breeding activity in New Brunswick. There most of the fox business is transacted, there being located in that place two or three fox exchanges and several sales ranches.

A large amount of outside stock, principally crosses, is finding its way into New Brunswick and is meeting with ready sale. When it is considered that New Brunswick is many times larger than Prince Edward Island and a very wealthy province, there can be no doubt that the introduction of the fox industry will be attended with the best of results for this island, as there can be little question that another avenue of purchase will be opened up for the foxes produced here; many of the companies now being formed in the sister province will doubtless procure their ranch stock here.
