N. Y. Stock Market Continued Upward During Last Week

NEW YORK, July 27—(AP)—The stock market swung upward last week with Industrials at a top since last August and the overall average approaching the 1947 peak.
Spurring short covering and investment demand in the share division was the persistence of inflationary psychology, an exceptionally large batch of boosted dividends and pleasing earnings compilations and hopes that the normal summer rally could stretch much farther.
The Associated Press 60-stock composite was up 12 points at 68.4 on the week and was only 6 of a point under the year's high of 69 established last Feb. 8. The five-day turnover of 5,422,950 shares compared with 5,938,973 the week before.

The market stumbled Monday on \$40,000 shares as the President's economic message to Congress failed to excite Wall Street. There was a mild recovery Tuesday but dealings dwindled to 790,000 shares, a bottom since June 30.
Wednesday the list negotiated its best runup since July 11 on an aggregate of 1,980,000 shares with selected industrials in the lead and carriers close behind.
Buyers maintained control Thursday with volume expanding to 1,570,000 shares, best since July 14. The industrials, led by steels and oils, went through the year's high and the general average recorded its widest gain since July 1. Mild liquidation ruled Friday. Transfers tapered to 1,150,000 shares.

U. S. Steel Prices Moving Upward

CLEVELAND, July 27—(AP)—With scrap prices soaring to the stratosphere, two large independent producers set a pattern for rate increases in the steel industry with boosts ranging from 85 to \$10 a ton in selling prices of their products, the magazine Steel reported today.

The American Rolling Mill Company, Middletown, O., and the Republic Steel Corporation initiated price advances, with Armco raising rates 85 to \$10 a ton on finished steel products, and Republic increasing its selling levels 85 to \$8 a ton.

"Expectations now are new price schedules will be promptly effected by other producing interests," said the magazine, "though it is understood subsidiaries of United States Steel Corporation will not take action until after the quarterly meeting of directors July 29."

"Raw materials were in the spotlight last week with scrap prices soaring as much as \$5.50 per ton, pig iron rising 83 to \$35.50 per ton at Northern Furnaces following the recent boost of \$3.50 on Southern iron, and by-product coke going up \$1.40 per ton at Chicago."

Steelmaking operations, rising for the third straight week, increased 2.2 points last week to 95 per cent of national ingot capacity, a level within two points of the record post-war production rate.

Agricultural Institute Meeting Held At Dalvey

The regular monthly meeting of the Prince Edward Island branch of the Agricultural Institute of Canada was held on Saturday, July 26th.

The members of the branch accompanied by their wives and families assembled at 3 p.m. at Dalvey. While the ladies and children enjoyed the bathing, the men were the guests of Mr. E. Smith, Superintendent of the National Park on a tour of the forestry nursery established in the park. In the unavoidable absence of Mr. Smith the party was conducted through the different sections of the nursery by Mr. Ford, who explained the work in hand, methods of nursery management, planting, spacing and the value of the different tree species which include white and red pine, spruce and hard or sugar maple. The visiting agriculturalists were keenly interested in the excellent stand of the seven or eight year old red pine. The size and vigor of the trees are an encouraging indication of what may be achieved in the field of re-land utilization on many of the light, dry soil areas of the Province, through a well-planned forestry program. After a picnic supper, the party returned to the Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, where an evening meeting was held in the vocational school building through the courtesy of Mr. R. Snazelle, office-in-charge.

Following a brief business session during which the president, Mr. W.N. Bask extended a hearty welcome to the ladies and reminded the members a new fiscal year reports on the National Convention of the A.I.C. held at Lethbridge in June were given by Mr. R.C. Parent, Superintendent, Experimental Farm, and by Mr. R.R. Hurst, Dominion Plant Pathologist, Charlottetown.

Opening his remarks with a description of the changing landscape seen during the 3,200 mile flight from Charlottetown to Lethbridge, Mr. Parent expressed his firm confidence in the agricultural potentialities of the Island. Commenting on the opening meeting of the convention, at which 500 to 400 members of the Institute were present, representing all sections of Canada, Mr. Parent drew attention to a statement in the Dominion president's address referring to the loss of technical men to the United States.

After dealing with the business and technical sessions of the convention, the speaker gave a brief word picture of the one-day 100-

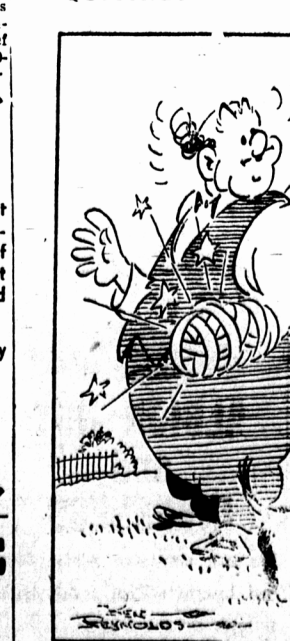
