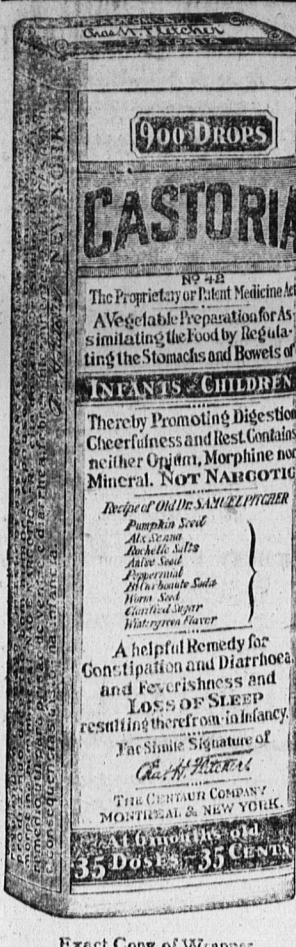

**ANOTHER STEAMER HAS GONE ASHORE ON THE MAGDALEN ISLANDS**  
HALIFAX.—The steamer which went ashore on Byron Island in the Magdalens, while on passage to Montreal in ballast, has arrived at Halifax. She was brought in under her own steam, and her salvaging was one of the biggest jobs ever performed on the Canadian coast. To the superintendent, H. Kjerland, of the Quebec Salvage company; Captain Brannen, of the Southern Salvage company, and A. MacGregor, representative of the London Salvage association, is due the credit of bringing in for repairs this 4000 ton ship after she had gone on jagged rocks which pierced her hull and even reached her engine room. The Halifax dry dock is now filled and the damaged steamer is to be taken on to New York for repairs.

With the coming in of the wreck there also comes the news that today a lumber-laden steamer has gone on the rocks on the Magdalen Islands, and both Salvage companies may undertake the work of getting her from the precarious position in which she now lies. The salvage men say they do not think it will be as difficult to save the steamer which went ashore today; the fact that she is lumberladen will, they feel assured, make her salvage much less difficult than the steamer with which they have just arrived.

When the news of the wreck on August 5th was received in Quebec, the Quebec Salvage and Wrecking company at once sent the steamer Strathcona and the schooner G. T. D., to the Magdalens. Superintendent Kjerland found the wreck broadside on a reef of jagged rocks that were dry at low tide. The holds were filled with water, the rocks penetrating through the plates in a number of places. Work was immediately commenced and in a short time one of the steamer's boilers was able to be scummed up and thus assisted in the handling of wrecking machinery. A MacGregor, who left Halifax for the Magdalens, via Picton, chartered the Amelia for the trip and arrived at Byron Island on the 8th inst. The Stella Maris, of the Southern Salvage company, also arrived from Halifax and gave valuable assistance.

When everything was in readiness for a pull the Strathcona, the Stella Maris and a government steamer made three attempts before they were able to budge the wreck. Finally she started and inch by inch for fifty feet she dragged slowly along and then with a tremendous rush that carried her to another rock from which with great difficulty she was pulled off. After being floated she was taken into a small bay in four fathoms of water and there the divers made some necessary repairs which enabled the steamer to be started on her trip to Halifax, which was long delayed on account of the dense fog. The saved steamer is about 6,000 tons gross and is only three years of age. In these days of scarce and decreasing tonnage the saving of such a ship is a feat of which all those connected with the work have just reason to be proud.

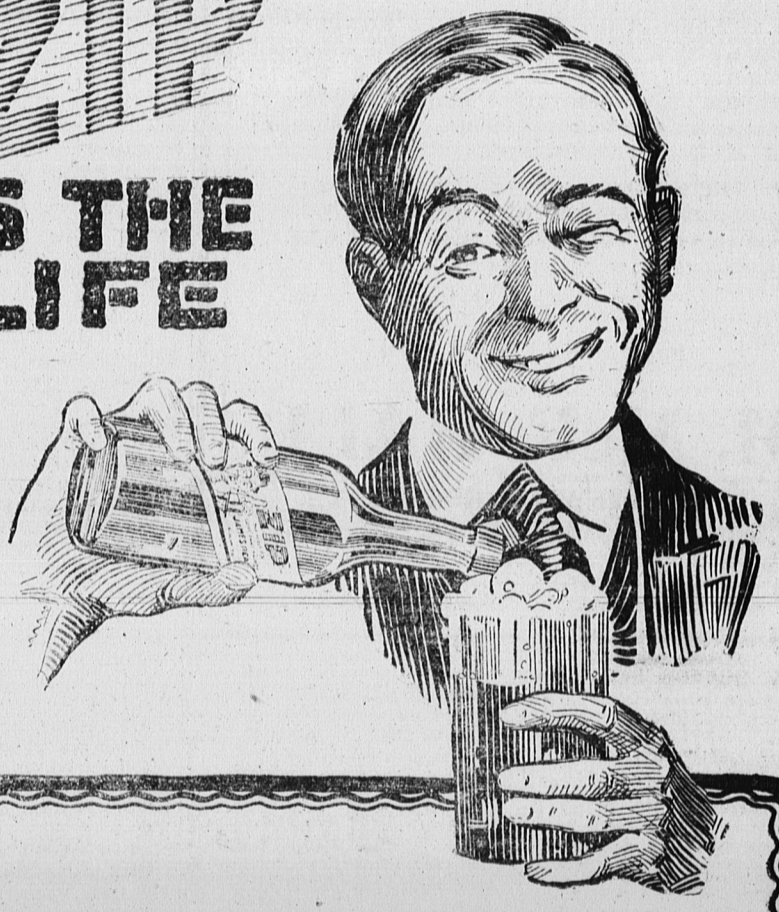
