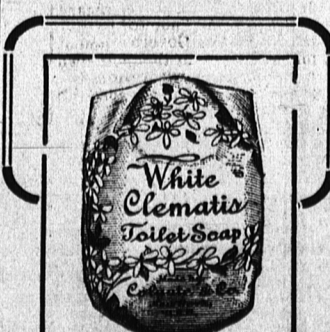

THE WINTER STEAMERS.—The Car Ferry has had another heavy ice fight. Leaving Pictou at 6 o'clock Friday morning after lying at the dock there since Wednesday on account of Thursday's storm, she battered her way around the east side of Pictou Island and as far as Wood Islands where night overtook her and she was obliged to lay up. On Saturday she again ploughed her way through arriving in Charlottetown about 5 o'clock. She brought 40 passengers, 140 tons and 120 bags mail. So well pleased were the passengers with the strenuous fight put up by Captain Murchison to bring them to the island that they delegated a committee consisting of Messrs J. M. Leard and C. L. Grant to formally convey to him an expression of their appreciation. The Car Ferry left Charlottetown for Pictou yesterday morning at 7 o'clock and at 9 o'clock last night was reported by the Stanley which is one mile south east of the east end of Pictou Island. The Stanley had left Georgetown at 4 o'clock Thursday afternoon and has been in the strait since. It is expected that both steamers will get into Pictou this morning.

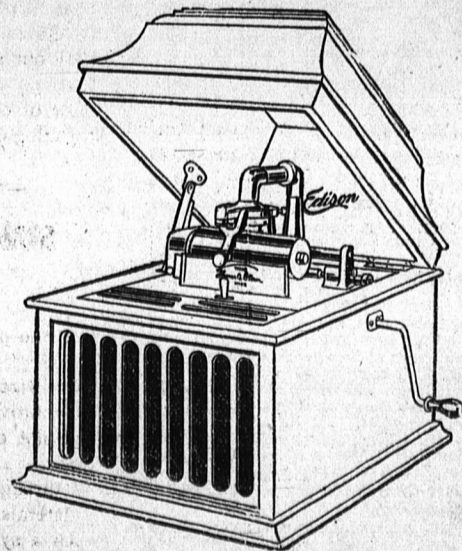
