Meeting hailed As decided blow To Axis Powers

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—(CP)—The meeting of foreign ministers of the American republics in Rio De Janeiro, which ended 10 days ago, is being hailed as a success and a decided blow to the Axis by the newspapermen and observers who are returning to Washington from its concluding sessions.

The conference resulted in two major decisions—a break in diplomatic and economic ties with the Axis by every western hemisphere nation with the exception of Argentina and Chile, and a long step forward in developing the natural resources and raw materials of Latin America in the service of the united nations.

It is confidently expected here now that the Chilean presidential elections are over and Juan Antonio Rios, long an exponent of full co-operation with the United States, has been elected—that Chile will follow the lead of the other Latin American states and break off relations with Germany, Japan and Italy.

It also is expected here that sooner or later Argentina will fall in line. There is no indication that Washington will attempt to force Argentina into changing her policy. One reason is that both the United States and Britain depend upon many Argentine exports which, if sunk off now, would seriously endanger the war production of both allied powers.

Economic Features

The economic features of the conference were not as spectacular as the diplomatic break with the Axis but, in the long run, they promise to be infinitely more important. In a general way, it was agreed by the 21 nations that hemispheric solidarity must be translated into positive and efficient action, including economic mobilization and the diversion of essential materials into the war machine of the united nations.

The United States emerged as the banker of this vast undertaking, agreeing to put up the money to develop the fabulously rich material wealth of Latin America in the interests of all allied powers, such as the financing of roads so that more Bolivian tin can be mined to replace the strategic metal that used to be imported from Malaya and the Netherlands East Indies.

The conference agreed to suppress Axis propaganda throughout Latin America and to take action against fifth columns and other subversive movements. This, it is pointed out, taken in conjunction with the severance of diplomatic and economic relations, should have the effect of plugging many of the holes in the allied blockade of the Axis nations and drying up the pools of international credit that Germany, Japan and Italy have been establishing there ever since the outbreak of war.

Argentina's Attitude

Argentina is expected eventually to break with the Axis when she is persuaded that the military strength of the United States has been mobilized sufficiently to shield her from aerial raids by any nation, Germany and Japan in particular. Until then, it is expected here that Argentina will pursue a neutral course, entertaining diplomatic relations with the Axis states.

This course, there is reason to believe here, is personally satisfactory to Ramon Castillo, acting president of Argentina, who long has been suspected of pro-Axis leanings. Newspapermen who covered the Rio conference returned with a deep conviction that a clear majority of the Argentine people disagree with their president but, because a constitutional "state of siege" has been declared, giving Castillo almost unlimited power, there is little that can be done about it.

Argentina, however, has entered wholeheartedly into defensive measures, calling up reserve officers, creating auxiliary services and retaining conscripted classes past their normal period of training. Argentina has an army of 100,000 men and her relatively strong and well-trained navy includes two battle-ships.

The United States, in the language of one of the returning news-

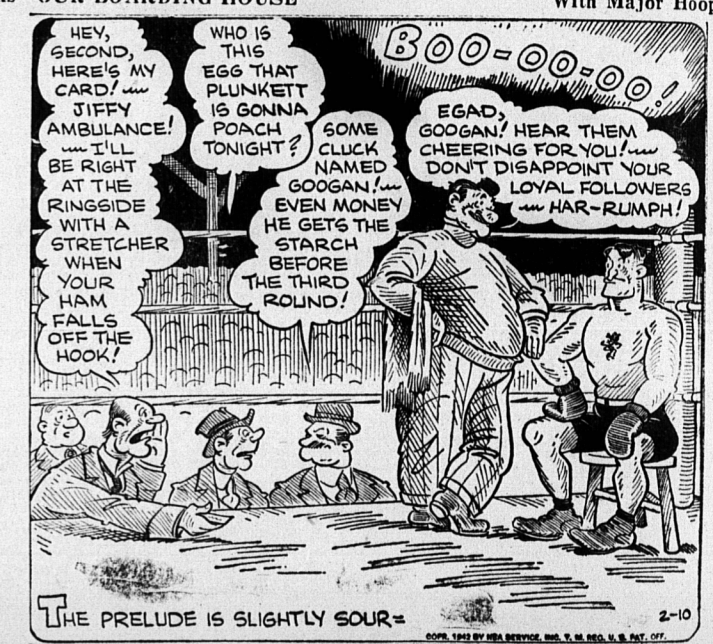
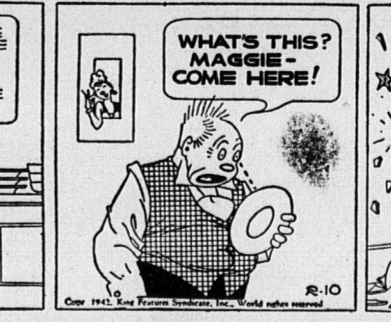
