ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

There was no crossing at the Capes yesterday.

The mails reached the City on Saturday about two o'clock.

The Stanley crossed to Pictou yesterday, day and leaves on return this morning at seven o'clock.

FO. 2 Co. C. A. has won third place for discipline at St. John last fall. St. John companies won first and second.

A summons for second offence against the Prohibitory Law has been served on George Arbuckle, returnable Friday.

THE Rev. J. Graham Molyor, B.D., West River is spending a term at Yale University in advanced Semitic study.

A LARGE number of commercial men crossed by the Stanley Saturday and came to the city by the special train which arrived at four o'clock.

THE walking on the sidewalks of the city on Saturday night was very dangerous. The silver thaw during the evening covered everything with ice and many were the falls.

COMMENCING today the Stanley will make round trips from Georgetown each day in order to relieve the present congestion of freight. With a daily return trip during the next few days and the Minto on theroute in the last of the week it is probable that the freight trouble will soon be over.

QUITE a quantity of ice was still found in the Strait on Saturday. The barrier is still across the mouth of Pictou harbor and the only entrance is through the passage opened by the Stanley. The breakage in the Stanley's propeller blades affects her speed very slightly and it has not been hard to escape the heavy ice as leads of open water have been easily found.

MR. LORR, agent of Marins returned Saturday afternoon from Pictou where he has been in connection with the winter steamers. In conversation with The Guardian he reports that the work upon the Minto is progressing very well. The job is in charge of a Halifax firm and they have two divers at work. On Friday evening they had one stop removed and the work of preparing for the new blades will in all probability be completed by Monday night. It is expected that the new blades will be attached by Thursday and the first trip of the Minto made on Friday or Saturday, barring accidents.

THE new postal and smoking car recently constructed at the P.E.I.R. works is almost ready for the road. It is larger than any of the other cars on the Railway and will be in keeping with the work already turned out.

Rev. Dr. Thomas Trotter, president of Acadia, arrived from New York yesterday en route to his home in Wolfville. Doctor Trotter said Mr. Rockefeller had decided to adhere to the dollar for dollar arrangement and will pay \$1,000 for every \$1,000 raised by the College.—The entire amount is \$100,000, payable quarterly, with January 1, 1903 as the time limit. There are five years in which to do collecting and it is probable an appeal will be made individually and later to the Baptist churches in a body.—St. John Telegraph.

Bertram Lea, Franklin Jenkins Ludlow Jenkins, Wallace Stewart and Felix Murphy were appointed in conjunction with the above mentioned officers to constitute a building committee with instructions to have plans and specifications prepared to call for and accept tenders and proceed at once with construction of hall 85x30 feet. John F. Hayden, was commissioned to have company incorporated, at the coming session of Parliament. Following is the committee to draft constitution and bye laws and report at next night's meeting: James T. Collins, M. D., Benson Weatherbie, Joseph P. Carroll. The hall when completed will be one of the largest and best finished in the Province, a credit to the company and an ornament to Vernon River. To L. C.
