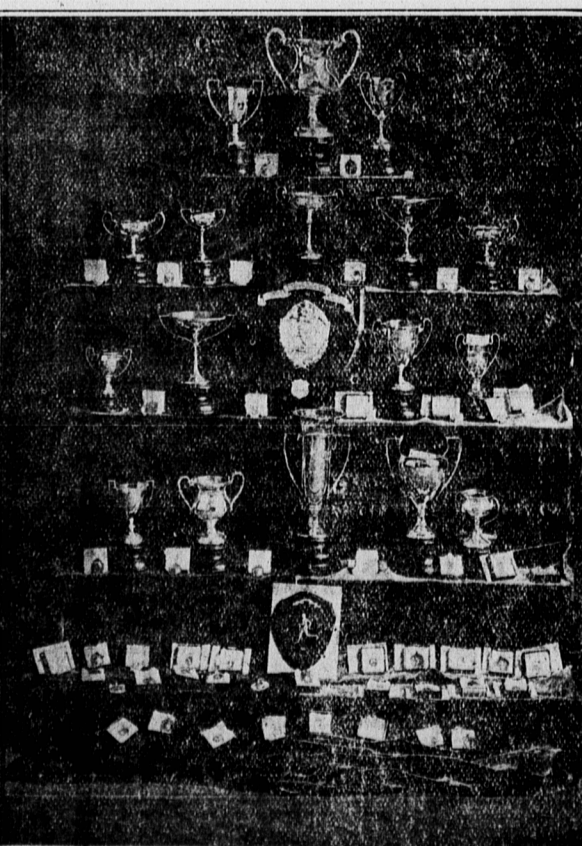

Maritime Religious Educational Council

Following is the concluding part of an article called "Tunnelling from Church Basement" to Front St., the first part of which appeared in these columns of June 2nd. This is a very interesting article on the progress of Maritime Religious Education throughout Canada by the General Secretary, Dr. Percy R. Hayward, of the Inter-Church Body known as the Religious Education Council of Canada.

The program carried out during the Staff Conference was one of great variety and value. Each morning at nine o'clock there was a brief worship period followed by Bible Study in three groups under the leadership of Rev. Ernest Thomas, Dr. H. B. Sharnan, and Professor McFadyen of Queen's University. In these groups the men and women grappled anew with the problem of interpreting the mind and spirit of Jesus so as to clarify their thinking in regard to the real message of Christianity. For the balance of the morning there were, on most days, departmental groups for planning work for the year; that is to say, boys' work, including all the boys' work secretaries of the country, who discussed the Tuxis and Tuxis Ranger programs from every standpoint and made plans for the coming year; the girls' work secretaries did the same for the C.G.I.T. program; the children's work secretaries faced, for the first time in a national way, the program of Children's work under twelve years of age; and the young people's workers made plans for a nationwide young people's program. In the afternoon, these departmental groups met again and a recreation period was held. In the evenings there was an hour for the discussion of general problems, when all departments came together, and at the close there was a series of most stimulating lectures by an outstanding specialist in Social Psychology, Professor E. C. Lindeman, New York, on "The New Psychology and Religious Education." In order to tunnel wisely the engineer must know human nature.

their womanhood and their manhood. Those who are of that opinion feel that it would have been more manly on the part of the Bell Government had they given women an equal vote with their fathers, husbands and brothers. As it is the farmer in most cases will go to the poll and vote for both a Councillor and an Assemblyman, while his good wife can vote only for the Assemblyman. Is that an equal vote, Madam? Is two to one an equal divide? Thousands of men who love, honor and respect their wives and hold the mothers of their children as equals would gladly see them equal with themselves at the ballot box. But the Bell government that framed the election law did not fix it that way!

Before the women were given the half vote with which they are now endowed, it is true that there were also a large number of men

who were and still are in the same half-vote category. These were roughly speaking about one-third more in number than the men who could vote for both Councillors and Assemblymen—say 800 to 600. But more of the men who had two votes naturally went proportionately to the polls and voted than of those proportionately who had but one vote, many of the latter thinking it not worth while. These men are described in the Government organ as "the men who own no real estate—who live in rented houses—the fishermen—the laborers," and specially singled out as fit subjects for the poll tax! (Note that they are spoken of as "men," not as males.) But they have to pay the poll-tax whether they vote or not. And these men have but one vote each.

To them it is taxation without representation at best, so far as one-half the House is concerned. Their womenfolk, whom the Bell organ describes as "female voters," are a little better off one way than their husbands and brothers, as the "females" do not pay poll taxes directly. They feel the pinch of this form of taxation in the home, however, quite as much as their men folk feel it outside. The men will elect the Councillors as before. With these men voters it will be one man, two votes. With two or three times as many votes behind them the Assemblymen will be elected on the principle of the Bell Government election law. How long will these men and women, who together make up three-fifths of the electorate, consent to have only one vote each while others have two?

Women, who were led to believe that they would have equal voting rights with men find themselves deceived. They were not deceived by the Conservative Government at Ottawa. They got equal voting rights with men in that quarter. If they are fit to vote for members of the House of Commons, are they not fit to vote for Councillors in our small Legislature? The Bell Government by its election law says they are not! Yet in face of this the Bell organ claims that the Bell Government and party have given to women the majority vote and the "majority influence at the election." Such was the Bell Government's gift to the women of this Province and such the deception that preceded it and that followed it.

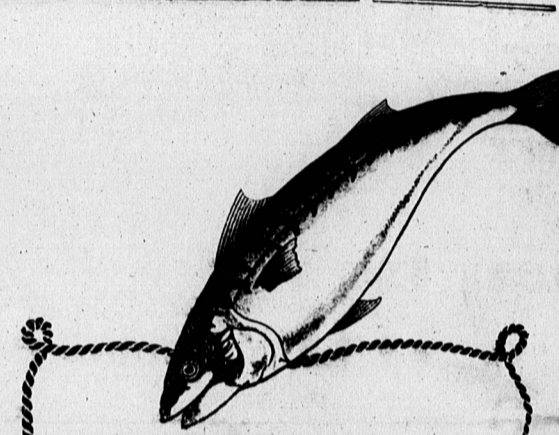
