Credit Meeting in Elmira

Rose and Mr. John C. Peters, of St. Andrew's were present. The meeting was presided over by Mr. John J. Campbell who introduced the speakers. Mr. Rose the first speaker, urged the necessity of the Study Clubs the only medium through which one may gain a clear and sound understanding of the Co-operative movement. He took as an example the success of the movement in the St. Andrew's Parish which was brought about only by intense study in the Study Clubs. He said we must study first every Co-operative venture before attempting any action whatsoever. He therefore, urged the people not to apply for a Credit Union Charter until a thorough understanding and knowledge of the Act be gained by all the members.

Mr. John C. Peters, second speaker, gave a brief outline of the Co-operative movement in general. He also said that the members should not undertake any Co-operative activity until it is first well understood by the members, each and every one when this method is adopted he said, we are on the right road to sound and true democracy. A general discussion took place by a number of the members present and many points regarding Credit Union were then cleared up. The chairman Mr. John J. Campbell extended a hearty vote of thanks to the visiting speakers and the meeting adjourned.
