## Maxim Favored To Win Over Olle Tandberg

NEW YORK, Jan. 8 (AP)—Olle Tandberg, the tall Swede who made headlines by upsetting Joe Baksi last July, makes his American pro debut tomorrow night at Madison Square Garden against favored Joe Maxim of Cleveland, a "cutie" boxing master.

Ordinarily there would have been little interest in this 10-round contest. But since the Joe Louis-Jersey Joe Walcott affair, every fight involving heavyweights has its angles.

If Tandberg shows enough ability to outsmart the foxy Maxim, he will move into the front row of heavyweight contenders behind Walcott. Maxim, beaten twice in three starts by Jersey Joe, almost has to win by a knockout to receive important recognition.

Only close students of European boxing ever heard of Tandberg before he outpointed Baksi, July 6, just when the Kilmont, Pa. clubber was headed for a September title date with Joe Louis. Because the fight was held in Stockholm, Olle's home town, many have taken a dim view of the verdict.

It's up to Tandberg, in his first pro start on this side of the pond, to prove that the upset of Baksi was no fluke.

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## Two Goals In Final Period Gives Steele-Coached Team 6-5 Win

Shooting two counters in the last part of the third period to break a 4-4 deadlock and then yielding one to their opponents in the last 24 seconds of the encounter, "Windy" Steele's Summerside All Stars last night opened the City Hockey League by skating to a surprising 6-5 victory over Prince of Wales Welshmen.

Given little chance before the game to defeat the fast skating City squad, Steele's crew, with Bobby Schurman their goalie holding the fort practically single-handed in the first three minutes of play, staged a comeback that sent them roaring into a three goal lead in the next seven minutes and left the ice at the end of the first period with a 3-1 lead as the losers punched home a goal in the last 42 seconds.

The Welshmen's chances went into the ascendancy all through the middle canto as they controlled play throughout the session to outscore their opponents by a 3-1 margin and knot the count at 4-4. Tring fast the Summerside team appeared headed for a beating but, playing strictly defensive hockey, they held the goal-hungry Welshmen at bay with Schurman again taking over the starring role.
