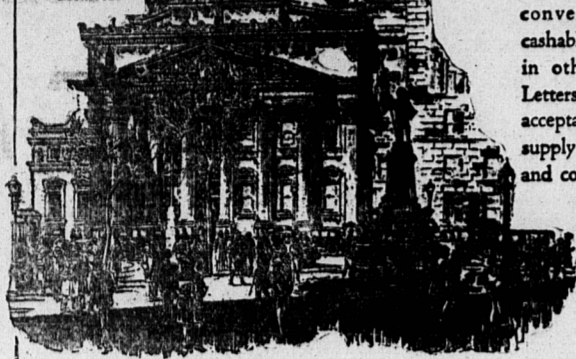

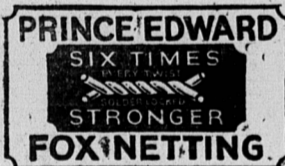

VISUAL EDUCATION

There is a thought among service men that motorists who always are forgetting to have water put in the battery will be improved if they could but see what happens to a battery so ignored. The bottom of such a battery container is filled with a mud-like mass. This mass is made up of plate area that once was active in providing strong, powerful current, and which was eaten away from lack of water.

SPEAKING OF MIXTURES

The ideal carburetor mixture, under average condition, is one that provides one part of gasoline to 15 or 16 parts of air.

DRYING OUR LININGS

Many a car still doing yeoman service for its owner does not boast of fully enclosed brakes. The result, as owners know, is that the brakes become water-logged and inefficient. The easy remedy is to run for a short distance with the service brake slightly depressed. Pressure should not be too great, however. The friction will soon dry out the linings.

RIGHT POSTURE BEST

One protection against fatigue when driving long distances is to sit erect, although relaxed. Slumping over the wheel, falling to take advantage of the spinal support provided by the back of the seat is one of the biggest factors in that tired feeling.

USING THE INDICATOR

Running the car slowly until the motor heat indicator is within the "driving range" area is the best way to make use of this modern device.

THEY ARE ADJUSTABLE

It does not pay simply to give up when the car doors develop a noise. In most of the later cars, the strikes which hold the doors tightly are adjustable and elimination of the noise requires no more than resetting the strike. It is a few minutes' job either at home or at the service station.

ENGINE BEING BROKEN-IN

It is the engine of the new car, not the speedometer, that is being broken in. Bearing this fact in mind, the motorist undergoing the process of being careful with the new car will remember that the arbitrary limit of, say, 30 miles an hour applies only when in high gear. In second gear, the engine is travelling at the same speed at 18 miles an hour or close to it.

WILL VANISH QUICKLY

Motorists who discover a seeming awkwardness about some individual manner of locating the controls in their new cars, as, say, the starter on the dash, will find their disappointment soon assuaged. One quickly gets on to the new system.

ADVICE WORTH HEEDING

It is an old and much ignored bit of advice, this of tightening the rim lugs a little at a time. It is well worth heeding, however.

To Speak For Vermont

MONTPELIER, Vt., June 13—Governor John E. Weeks of Vermont has accepted an invitation from the Central Vermont and Canadian National Railways to address the radio audience of six and possibly eight Canadian stations in a hookup from the Atlantic to the Rockies on the evening of Thursday, June 20.

Governor Weeks will invite his Canadian listeners to visit the Green Mountain and American States, often described as the "Switzerland of America."

The hookup now being arranged for the Vermont program will include Canadian National Radio station AR Quebec City, Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, Winnipeg and Yorkton, Sask.

Big Trade For British Industries

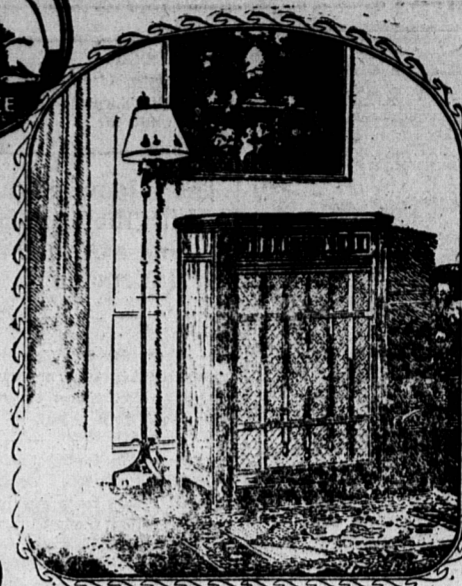

LONDON, June 13—Good business is being done by exhibitors at the British Industries Fair at the white city. Canadians and Americans are giving big orders especially for novelties and fancy goods of all kinds.

Following the Queen's purchase of a handpainted toilet set, a £2,000 order has been given by an American buyer. The firm from which Her Majesty bought fleece tweed bags sold \$500 worth of the same kind in one day. Another exhibitor has sold his entire exhibit of art needlework while the Irish Linen Guild has sold its entire exhibit for £12,000. Among other orders are \$300 worth of tin soldiers for America and 2,000,000 razor blades for the home trade.

An order placed by a Canadian buyer with a silver company is said to be the largest ever booked by the firm at the fair. Large purchases are also being made of luxury leather goods. Equally satisfactory business is being done at the industries fair in Birmingham, orders mainly for hardware goods and cutlery having come in from all parts of the world.

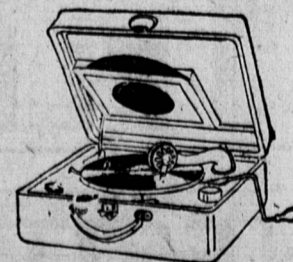

Impending Change In Immigration

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., June 13 — Commenting on the change in immigration certificates to be effective in the United States July 1, the Portsmouth (N. H.) Herald says editorially:

"American citizenship is too costly, for those not born to it. After July 1 of this year, certificates of arrival for immigrants will be sold at \$5 apiece, to those qualified for them, instead of being given free. A declaration of intention to become a citizen will be raised from \$1 to \$5.

Second papers will cost \$10 instead of \$4. Aliens who came into the country illegally or without inspection before June 3, 1921, must pay \$20 for a certificate of arrival. Those who have sneaked in since cannot become citizens at all.

"This last rule may seem harsh. It is the penalty for breaking a clear and important law during these last eight years.

"On the other hand, privilege of obtaining a certificate of arrival for those who came into the country informally before the adoption of the present restriction system in 1921, will benefit many thousands. It applies to Canadians who came many years ago and have not record of their entry, immigrants from many lands who do not know the precise

facts of their arrival, deserters from ships who have settled in the country, etc. Many of them will be glad to pay their \$20 and obtain the status of lawful immigrants with privilege of citizenship.

"All in all, these rules and charges should make American citizenship more highly prized than it used to be."

Wants British Model Followed

BUFFALO N. Y., June 13 — John G. Reville, chief of the Buffalo detective bureau, advocated the patterning of American penal institutions after the Canadian and English mo-

del in an address before a group of business men here.

Reville recalled that a local criminal freed because a jury disagreed, was cheered by a crowded courtroom, and added:

"This perverted hero worship drew the sharp condemnation of William H. Taft, chief justice of the United States. From this typical American crowd, cheering an arch criminal who acknowledged their plaudits by shaking his manacled hands over his head, we draw our juries. As long as this country continues to make heroes of its criminals, the country will have criminals and crime waves."

In England and Canada, Chief Reville declared, criminals pay the actual penalty prescribed by law and in some cases really are reformed.
