IN MEMORIAM

DOUGALD MacMILLAN There passed away at Vancouver British Columbia, on Saturday, October 16th, 1926, after a brief illness, Dougald MacMillan, in the 64th year of his age.

In his youthful days he taught school for some years in his native province; but left the Island in 1883, locating, first at Pembroke, Ontario, and then proceeding to the Red River Valley where he taught school for a brief period and afterwards was engaged in business for some time in one of the smaller towns of Manitoba.

Moving further west, he taught school in what was then the Territory of Utah, and after giving up the teaching profession he spent some years in the Mining business in Montana, Colorado, Idaho, and other Western States during the pioneer days of that industry there.

He was Chief of Police and City Clerk of the town of Phoenix, B. C., during the days of the mining boom in that district.

He was one of the many Island men who comprised a part of that band of adventurers who first entered the Klondyke during the famous gold rush, few of whom now survive.

After his return from the gold fields he was engaged in business in Northern British Columbia for a number of years, but on the commencement of operations in the Cobalt region, mining interests again claimed his attention.

During more recent years, he became interested in the oil business, and spent some time in the various oil fields of Texas, Oklahoma and other Southern States.

Latterly he resided in California, and recently moved to British Columbia where his death occurred.

In the extensive field of his various activities, ranging over the entire North American Continent, the late Mr. MacMillan made many friends, and was loved and respected by all who came within the sphere of his influence, for his kindly and sympathetic nature, his sterling character, his keen and logical mind and his broad and tolerant views of all questions.

His funeral was held on Tuesday, October 19th, and all that was mortal of this worthy son of Prince Edward Island was laid to rest in the beautiful Ocean View Cemetery, Central Park.

Thus there has passed into the great beyond, another of that once numerous band of Islanders, who imbued with the true pioneering spirit, have extended the frontiers of civilization on this continent, and whose trail has led— "Over the burning heat of the desert sands "And the cold of the Arctic snows."

The late Mr. MacMillan was never married. There are left to mourn three brothers, Duncan and Neil in California; Angus in Massachusetts, and one sister Mrs. Archibald MacCannell of Mount Stewart, P. E. I., besides a host of relatives and friends, by whom his genial personality will long be missed.

The deceased, who was 54 years of age was a native of Summerside and a life-long resident, being a daughter of the late Captain Daniel MacDonald. Three brothers and two sisters also survive: Dr. George, John and Robert MacDonald, all in the Canadian West; Miss Effie MacDonald, of Wetaskiwin, Alberta, and a married sister, Rev. Father McLellan and Rev. Hettie of Everett, Mass. The funeral took place Saturday at 2 p. m. to the People's Cemetery.
