Troops Called Out To Evacuate Bonus Army From United States Property — Tear Gas And Bullets Employed To Oust Demonstrators — "Reds" Blamed For Trouble.

OTTAWA, July 28.—(By The Canadian Press)—"The Conference is shaping like a success," observed Lord Hailsham, British Secretary for War, interviewed today. "We are all working very hard," he added. "It is absolutely vital that this Ottawa Conference should be a success," Lord Hailsham went on. "If it isn't, to my mind it means the breaking up of the Empire within my lifetime. And of course, if the Empire goes, there is little hope for the world."

"Can Great Britain give the little embargo asked for by Australia and Canada on Soviet wheat, lumber etc.," Lord Hailsham was asked. "We may not be able to do all that we are asked, but we can certainly do something," Lord Hailsham replied.

(Canadian Press) WASHINGTON, July 28.—One unidentified veteran was shot dead and another seriously wounded in rioting between bonus seekers and police near the Capitol today, and troops were ordered out at the direction of President Hoover.

A bullet through the heart was the one that killed, when police opened fire upon veterans who were advancing toward them. A group of his comrades took the man to a hospital in a patrol wagon, accompanied by two policemen. He was dead when he reached there. There was no mark of identification about the body. Another bonus marcher is in serious condition with a bullet wound in the neck and lower abdomen. Doctors said his recovery was doubtful. Several other bonus marchers were treated for lesser injuries inflicted by brickbats.

Unable To Maintain Order  
Col. Patrick Hurley, Secretary of War, ordered cavalry from Fort Myer to rush into the city at fast pace, saying he had been informed by the President that "the civil government of the district of Columbia has reported to him it is unable to maintain law and order." After hearing a report from Officer George Shinsault, who said he fired the first shot, Pelham D. Glassford, police chief, said the shooting was "justified." Several police were injured, one, Private Scott, being reported to have died from a blow by a flying brick that hit him in the head. This report, which could not be verified immediately, aroused the police to anger in the minutes before the rioting that led to the shooting.

### No Statements Made As Yet

Great Britain And Dominions Apparently Waiting The Nature Of The Quid Pro Quo Before Making More Detailed Statements Of Policy.

(By George Hamilton, Canadian Press Staff Writer) OTTAWA, July 28.—The Empire Conference moves forward to its climax. The statement issued by Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin, leader of the British delegation—while ostensibly a review of tariff advantages enjoyed by Empire goods in the British market—makes clear that the British delegation aims to see:

- (1) Reductions in the rates of duty now imposed by the Dominions on British goods.
- (2) Curtailment of the power of customs authorities to impose arbitrary valuations for duty purposes.

Although not stated as such, they are Dominion concessions Great Britain evidently has in mind, if she is to maintain or extend the preferences she now grants to Empire goods under her new tariff system. Around British headquarters, there is keen conjecture how far the Dominions will be prepared to advance along these lines. The Dominions on their part, are no less anxious to know how far Great Britain will be ready to reciprocate with preferences on natural products, what she will be prepared to do in regard to Russian dumping. So far, British headquarters again assert, the British delegation has made no offer of tariff preferences to the Dominions. Thus both Great Britain and the Dominions are apparently waiting the nature of the quid pro quo before making more detailed statements of policy. When these statements of policy are made—

### STRONG CALL FOR KAISERISM

Hitlerites And Nationalist Party Confident Of Victory In Germany's Sunday Elections.

BERLIN, July 28.—(A.P.)—Adolf Hitler's threat that democracy in Germany must die within a few days was followed up today by a strong call for "Kaiserism" from Dr. Alfred Hugenberg, leader of the Nationalist party which, with Hitler's National Socialists, is dedicated to putting Germany back in her "place in the sun." "Kaiserism is the country's safest guarantee for a clean, strong, righteous state," Dr. Hugenberg told an audience in Koenigsberg assembled

### Conference Activities

OTTAWA, July 28.—(By The Canadian Press)—"I am here to render whatever assistance I can to the conference in matters in which Nova Scotia has an interest," was the explanation given of his arrival here today by Hon. S. Harrington, Premier of Nova Scotia. The Premier is accompanied by Percy Black, Minister of Highways. Nova Scotia's interests, the Premier said, lay chiefly along the lines of coal and steel, lumber and orchard fruit. ### Three Years For Perjury

PICTOU, N. S., July 28.—(By The Canadian Press)—Alfred Falconer of Truro today was sentenced to serve three years in Dorchester Penitentiary on a charge of perjury arising out of his marriage to Edwina Rumley, aged 14, of Stellarton. The marriage took place on June 27, 1932. Crown Prosecutor R. H. McLeod produced evidence to prove that Falconer knew the girl was only 14 when he secured the license in Stellarton.

### Church Meeting Ends In Disorder

(Canadian Press) KENTVILLE, N. S., July 28.—Dragged from beneath the pulpit where she was praying, an 18-year-old girl was the centre of a near riot last night at the annual conference of the Full Gospel Church at Scott's Bay.

An uncle who had just arrived from the United States reentered the church and attempted to take her out of it. They were met at the door by the girl's father, who insisted that his daughter should continue her prayers. Blows were struck, and others joined in the fray. The meeting ended in disorder.

Royal Canadian Mounted Police from Kentville, who investigated the affair today, heard complaints from Paul Barnett, leader of the Full Gospel adherents along the Bay of Fundy shore, that his meetings often had been interrupted by residents of the district who were antagonistic to his faith. ### VON GRONAU LEAVES FOR OTTAWA TODAY

MONTREAL, July 28.—(By The Canadian Press)—Captain Wolfgang Von Gronau's Greenland flying boat, thrice conqueror of the Atlantic, leaves the seaplane base at Longueuil at 10 o'clock tomorrow for Ottawa, reaching the Canadian Capital at approximately 11:30 A. M.

Several changes in schedule were announced by the Germans today. From Ottawa the flying boat will go to Chicago direct, not returning to Montreal tomorrow night as originally planned. Prince Rupert, B. C. was named as its Pacific coast destination. They will spend the day discussing with Government officials the possibilities of establishing a regular trans-Atlantic service over the northern route. Capt. ### Terrible Tragedy In New Brunswick

Two Men Lose Lives At Minto When Attempting To Rescue Three Children Who Were Later Found Dead At Bottom Of Mine Shaft.

MINTO, N. B., July 28.—The adventurous spirit of youth urged a group of lads to explore an old coal mine here today, led to the deaths of three boys and two men, and for a time threatened to exact a larger toll.

The dead, overcome by poisonous fumes, were: Allen Gaudin, 12; Cyril Stack, 14; Vernon Stack, 9; Vernon Betts and Thomas Gallant. Others affected by the gas were reported out of danger tonight. Betts and Gallant, both of whom leave families sacrificed their lives in a vain effort to rescue the three youths. With a fourth companion, Joseph O'Leary, the boys had been picking berries. Coming to the mine shaft, unused for several years, they decided to explore the area below, ignorant that "black damp" or accumulations of irres-

### Ontario Man Is Charged With Bribery

OTTAWA, July 28.—(By The Canadian Press)—Charging bribery of a customs officer the United States Government, through J. A. Ritchie, K. C., counsel, today applied for the extradition of Harry Low, of Windsor, Ont. The hearing is being held before Judge E. J. Daly. Low, recently convicted here on a charge of falsely billing a cargo of beer for importation into the United States, is alleged to have attempted to bribe a United States customs officer at the Port of Nyando, New York State.

Inspector William C. Dodds, of Nyando, was the first witness called today. He declared he had been offered \$300 a car to permit the false billing of cars through Nyando. This was in August, 1931. The offer was made by a man named George Gillard, who was accompanied by Low, according to Inspector Dodds. The Inspector denied he had set a trap to catch Low. "I just let Low go as far as he wanted to," he replied in answer to Royal A. Hughes, counsel for Low. Low was arrested here on June 23. The hearing is continuing.

### WILL CONTINUE FIGHT FOR JUSTICE

WASHINGTON, July 28.—(A.P.)—From Walter W. Waters of Portland, Oregon, the titular commander of the "bonus expeditionary forces" came the assertion tonight that "no matter what may happen from now on, the B. E. F. will carry on." "If driven from Washington," he said in a statement, "it will organize elsewhere and continue the fight for justice for the veterans and the civilian people of the United States. We have gone too far now to quit." The Waters statement, telephoned to newspaper offices, included the assertion that a life was sacrificed "to serve the political interests of the administration."

### Lord Hailsham Discusses The Irish Situation

OTTAWA, July 28.—(By The Canadian Press)—"What is the use of mediation with a man like Mr. De Valera who won't budge?" asked Lord Hailsham, British Secretary for War, attending the Imperial Conference here, when he discussed the Irish situation during an interview today. Lord Hailsham said President De Valera wants, "so he told Mr. Thomas and me," an Irish Republic with Ulster in. "But Ulster doesn't want to get in," added the Secretary for War, "and obviously Mr. De Valera's hope is impossible of achievement. I asked Mr. De Valera what more power he would have as a Republic than he has as President of the council; he is really fighting for a shadow."
