At the present time when Summerside has its swift sailing Northumberland to connect it with the mainland, few there probably are, who are aware that over half a century ago in 1841, the "swift sailing packet Dolphin" kept up weekly communication between Bedeque and Shediac. The Colonial Herald of 1841 dates she sailed from Bedeque each Thursday and returned each Monday, weather permitting. The packet was well fitted up for the comfort of passengers and the announcement added that "persons going from Charlottetown or any other part of the Island will find their way to Richibucto, Miramichi, or any part of N. S. or N. B. twice every week, Thursdays and Sundays to St. John; and on Mondays and Fridays to Miramichi etc. Cabin passengers were charged 7s. 6d for crossing and steerage passengers 5s. While horses and cattle were charged 7s. 6d each.
