Player Pianos and Church Organs

STORMY SCENE IN ST. PAUL OVER MIXED JURY

ST. PAUL, March 15.—The storm which arose here over the confinement of seven women and five men for two days and two nights in a mixed jury case was increased today when Gov. Preuss of Minnesota declared "never would I allow Mrs. Preuss to go through such an ordeal."

The seven year fight of St. Paul women's organizations for an absolute equality of rights with men has received a decided setback. Seven husbands have sown the seeds of an organized movement against any more mixed juries in St. Paul.

The jury of seven women and five men in the case of George Preuss, charged with stealing an automobile, was "hung up" for two days and two nights before a verdict of guilty was returned.

No sooner had the jury been discharged with the usual thanks by Judge Catlin than a great hue and cry went up. Husbands of the women serving on the jury didn't mind doing the housework and caring for the children during the day, but when at night their wives were herded into chain gang formation and locked with the men in one jail room, where there were no screens of curtains to shield the feminine section of the improvised dormitory, the end of duty as good citizens was reached.

One of the husbands so vehemently outlined to Judge Catlin his position as an American and a taxpayer that he narrowly escaped citation for contempt. He made full use of his unexpurgated vocabulary and declared that neither his wife nor himself ever would serve on a jury, let the penalty be what it would.

"Never have I been thus spoken to in my official capacity," said Judge Catlin today, "but I was convinced that in the circumstances the man was not responsible, and I allowed him to get away with his position as an American and a taxpayer. I believe it did him good."

"When they put us in the jail the first night," said Mrs. Josephine Brown, one of the jurors, "we just sat around on the edges of the beds and talked about the case until we were nearly dead. Then some one mentioned going to bed. I am sure it was a man."

MEETING ARRANGED—The adjoining Presbyterian congregations of Caledonia, Murray Harbor South and Wood Island require over \$1500 a year from the Home Mission Funds of the church in order to maintain regular services in the congregations and pay the minimum stipend to their pastors. This is felt to be a severe strain on the funds and in order to relieve, if possible, the existing situation the Presbytery at its last meeting appointed a commission consisting of Rev. J. M. MacLeod, Dr. H. W. McEwen, Rev. J. S. McKay and Rev. J. A. McLean to consider the situation, confer with all parties interested, and seek to evolve some plan, by rearrangement of boundaries and co-operation with the Methodist church, which also draws on its H. M. funds for the work in this district whereby adequate services can be given to all parts and the church funds relieved of the present strain. To carry out the Presbytery's orders meetings will be held, weather permitting, at Caledonia, Tuesday, March 21, 10 a. m., Murray River 7 p. m., Murray Harbor South, Wednesday 22, 10 a. m., Little Sands, 3 p. m., Wood Islands 7 p. m.

Good Roads

(Prepared under the direction of the Canadian Good Roads Association.)

The announcement is made by the executive of the Canadian Good Roads Association that the ninth annual convention of the Association will be held at the Empress Hotel, Victoria, B.C., on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, June 13, 14, 15 and 16. The object of the capital of the Pacific province marks the fulfillment of the desire of the controlling heads of the Association to emphasize its truly national scope by so selecting convention points that each section of the Dominion shall be visited in turn. They may now truthfully claim to have covered Canada from coast to coast, the 1921 gathering having been held in Halifax while the seven previous conventions were distributed as follows: Two in Montreal and one each in Toronto, Hamilton, Ottawa, Quebec and Winnipeg.

The convention is being held in direct co-operation with the Good Roads League of British Columbia and the Good Roads Associations of the western provinces. The official recognition extended to the Canadian Association is indicated by the fact that assurances have been received of the presence of delegates of Dominion Government, highway officials, provincial ministers and their deputy ministers, and chief engineers, highway commissioners, and the mayors, councilors and engineers of many municipalities. There will also be representatives of contracting firms, suppliers of paving materials, and machinery, and the automotive industry. Messrs. S. L. Squire and William Findlay, of the executive committee, made a special trip to the Coast to arrange the preliminaries of the convention, and both in British Columbia and while en route through the West they received repeated assurances of interest in and support for the convention.

Comprehensive Programme

Secretary-Treasurer George A. McNamee is now preparing at the Association's head offices in the New Birks Building, Montreal, the tentative programme for the convention. It will include addresses by distinguished highway authorities of Canada and the United States, and will be given more comprehensive than at any previous convention, as an extra day will be devoted to business sessions, making four days instead of three utilized in past years. All sessions will be conducted on daylight saving time if it is in force in Victoria. For the fifth day, Saturday, a number of sightseeing trips will be arranged which should prove both educative and entertaining. Considerable attention will be given in the agenda to the experience gained in the course of the past two years in connection with Federal highway aid. Statistics collected by the Dominion authorities show that up to September 30 last approximately fifty per cent of the Federal appropriation of \$20,000,000 had been absorbed. Eight provinces had participated (Alaska being the exception), and in all 126 projects had been undertaken, representing a total mileage of about 3,800 miles and an estimated total expenditure of \$24,000,000 with forty per cent of this sum being drawn from the Dominion grant. Other subjects to be discussed at the convention include cost data, highway financing, economical methods of improving existing earth roads, and greater attention to maintenance.

The Canadian Good Roads Association is a member of the Permanent International Association of Road Congresses, and has the right to send five delegates to the conventions of that body, the next of which will be held in 1923 at Seville, Spain, after being left in abeyance during the war years. It is probable that at the Victoria convention a proposal will be made to invite the International Association to meet next in Canada, either in 1925 or 1926. If such an invitation is extended and accepted, it will be the first time that the International Association has held a convention outside of Europe. Minister is President.

The president of the Canadian Good Roads Association is Hon. S. J. Latta, former Minister of Highways for Saskatchewan and now Minister of Education for that province. He has been taking a close personal interest in all the arrangements for the convention, and will preside over most of the business sessions.

As in former years, the main convention will be supplemented by special conferences of allied interests. These will include the second annual inter-provincial conference of Government highway officials, who will hold sessions on all three days of the convention, the second annual conference of the provincial Good Roads Associations with one session, and the second annual conference of municipal road officials, with one or more sessions.

It is expected that groups of delegates will be formed by provinces or cities, to discuss special problems of highway interest. Full sessions with one session, and the second annual provincial centres. Informal receptions will probably be organized for the party at such points, while an effort will be made to arrange for a day's stopover at Vancouver on the return journey.
