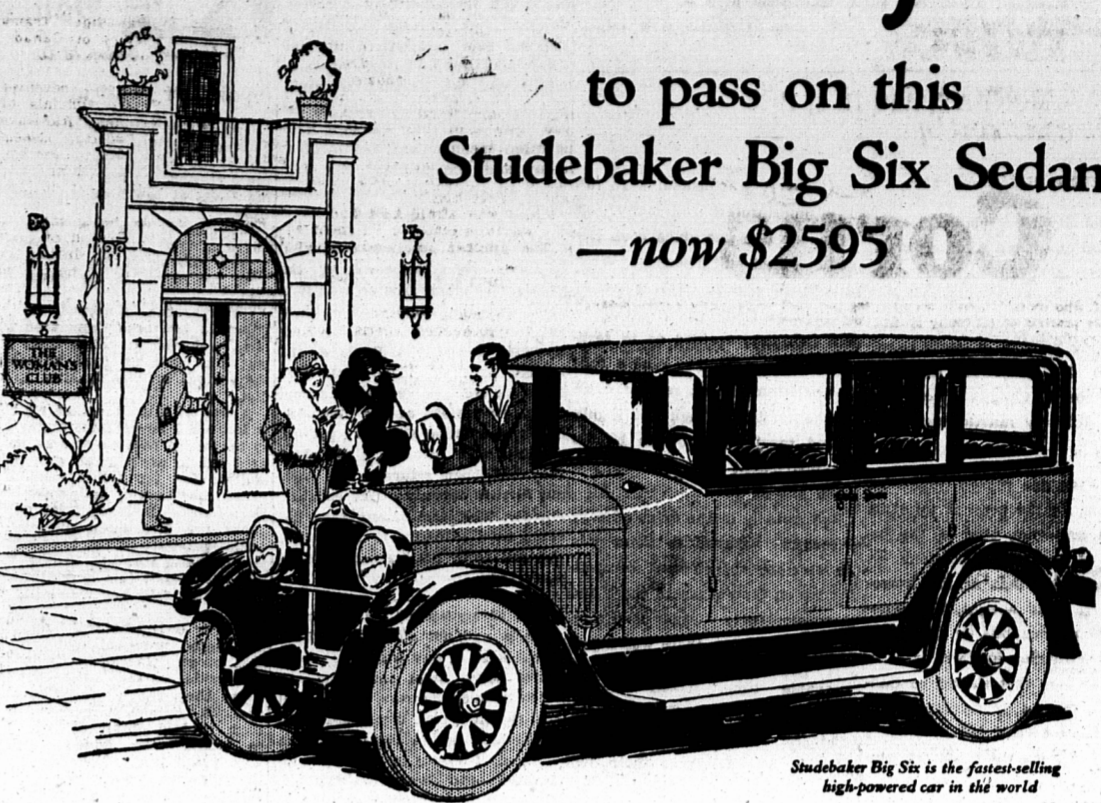

**AT ROTARY**

At the monthly meeting of the Rotary Club, held on Thursday night, the speaker was Mr. Justice Arsenault, an honorary Rotarian, who gave an admirable address on Parliamentary Practice and Procedure. It was one of the series of addresses which are being delivered before the Club on Canadian Citizenship, in accordance with the request of the Canadian Advisory Board, and approved of by Rotary International.

The speaker confined his remarks to the parliamentary procedure and practice of Great Britain, upon which our Canadian governmental system is modelled, both federally and provincially. In Canada, the Governor-General, the Senate and the House of Commons, are the counterparts respectively of the King, the House of Lords and the House of Commons. The analogy exists in a masterly manner.

The address contained much material, in the form of the Lieutenant-Governor, the Legislative Council and the House of Assembly, except that the Council now exists in only two provinces, Quebec and Nova Scotia.

In the course of his clear and concise analysis of the British system of government he showed that the latter is one of the most democratic in the world, all the powers being in the hands of well-to-do citizens.

The hearty appreciation of the King, the Rotarians were shown by prolonged applause. The King in Parliament, the prerogatives and functions of the King, the Cabinet, the Prime Minister, the House of Commons and the House of Lords were discussed in turn by His Lordship in a very illuminating and instructive manner.

Among other things, he pointed out that the three main prerogatives of the King, as stated by the constitutional authorities are: (1) To be consulted, (2) To encourage, (3) To warn.

It was pointed out that the people after all, through their representatives are the real rulers of the country, the Commons having the power of withholding supply there was an exhibition of the executive gives a full account of how the money has been spent. The functions of the various elements of the Federal and Provincial governmental systems in Canada were treated of by His Lordship with step dancing.
