At the start light hedging pushed on trading was tight with scattered purchases by mills, eastern and southern firms lifting prices. Buenos Aires continued at unchanged levels.

Traders merely went through the motions in today's post-holiday session of the stock exchange. Turnover was light and not until near the end of business did any activity enter the market. Price changes were narrow and irregular.

Consolidated smelters and International Nickel pushed up a minor fraction in pivotal metals and Imperial was higher in oils. Bathurst was also modestly better in papers and Montreal power in utilities.

In Industrials Canada Cement and Steel of Canada Preferred were harder and Arnew-Surpass and Dominion Coal Preferred slipped. Canada Steamship Preferred advanced in transportation.

National Breweries Preferred gained a major fraction among miscellaneous issues boarded and the common recovered an early loss. Lake of the Woods tacked on a minor fraction gain and Bruck Silk worked backward.

Toronto Stock Exchange

TORONTO, Oct. 14 (CP) — MI-OR gains for the gold and industrial shares and small losses for the base metals marked the action today on the Toronto stock exchange. Western oils were dull any unchanged throughout. Trading volume at 144,000 shares for the day showed little change from the recent average.

Active bidding for Hovey Gold on the news that the company had acquired a property in the Porcupine district, moved the price up to 30 cents and the close at 28 showed a gain of 7 cents net.

Trading was on a fairly small scale in the base metals with minor losses showing at the close for smelters, Hudson Bay, Normetal, Sherritt and Waite-Amulet. Ventures gained 5 cents. Steep Rock 3 and Noranda 1-4.

Utilities held to the up side. Bell Telephone gained 3-4 to 1.53. Consumers Gas was a point up at 131 for a broken lot and gains of 1-2 or more were netted by Canada Steamships Pfd, Moore Corporation and International Milling Pfd.

Western oils were unchanged but for a loss of 2 cents for Dalhousie for broken lots.

LIVESTOCK

MONTREAL, Oct. 14 (CP) — Today's report of the Livestock Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture stated:

There were 538 cattle, 553 sheep and lambs, 768 hogs and 817 calves for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today including some 200 cattle held over.

Common quality cattle and grass calves were about 25 cents lower. Other kinds of livestock were steady.

Yesterday's sales were steady for good kinds of cattle. Common and medium kinds were weak to 25 cents lower. Canners and cutters sold from \$3 to \$4.25 mostly \$3.50 to \$4. Common cows were \$4.50; \$5 and medium cows mostly \$3.25 to \$5. Veal calves ranged from \$12.50 to \$13 with a few calves up, to \$13.50. Drinkers \$7 to \$8.50 and grassers \$5 to \$6.25, mostly \$5.75 to \$6.

Good ewes and wethers were \$11. Buck lambs and culls were \$9 per hundredweight. Sheep were \$4 to \$7.

Hogs were firm at \$15 for B-1 dressed, \$11.25 for B-1 alive fed and watered and up to \$11.35 off trucks delivered. Grade A drew \$1 per hog premium with discounts on off grades. Sows were \$8.75 to \$10 live weight.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14 (CP) — The Canadian dollar advanced 1-16 of a cent in today's foreign exchange dealings to a discount of 11 3-8 per cent in relation to United States funds. (Ottawa foreign exchange control board rate 9.09-9.91 per cent discount.)

The pound sterling finished unchanged at \$4.03 3-4 but Uruguayan and Argentine pesos were firmer. Uruguay currency advanced 5 cent to 46.25 cents and the free Argentine peso was .11 cent higher at 23.66 cents.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14 (AP) — Brief and tentative recovery shifts in the stock market today faded before another wave of apprehension regarding Russia's ability to prevent the taking of Moscow by the Germans.

Canadian stocks were dull with active issues ranging mostly fractions lower. Distillers Seagram common lost 1-2 while preferred was up 1-8; International Nickel declined 1-4; Walkers Common 5-8; Preferred 1-8; Ford gained 1-8; and Brazilian Traction and Imperial Oil were unchanged.

The recovery stalled near midday and thereafter the list paced out a slow retreat to finish with most of the leaders under water fractions to a point or more. Certain coppers, rubbers and specialties registered the downward pull.

A closing loss of 3 of a point in The Associated Press 60-stock composite after the rather steep slide last week carried the market to the lowest average levels since July 1 at 41.5.

Transfers were small throughout, totalling 435,000 shares compared with 485,023 last Friday.
