The schedules disclosed total liabilities of \$96,268, with nominal assets of \$6,800. Of these liabilities about \$7,000 is secured. There are about four hundred unsecured creditors, of whom at least two hundred are employees of the hotel. Their claims aggregate \$5,315, and average about \$25 each. The remainder of the creditors' claims are for hotel supplies and include almost every conceivable commodity.
