THIS death took place at the residence of Archibald McKinnon, Bellevue, on Dec. 3rd, of Miss Christie McPhee in the 30th year of her age. She was a daughter of Angus and Annie McPhee, both deceased about ten years ago. Her death was not unexpected, for the illness lasted five years, and she was bedfast for two years, all of which was borne with true Christian patience, and she bore up admirably under rheumatism's most excruciating pangs. Her life's errand was well fulfilled. She was always willing to help the weak or helpless, and administer good where necessary. She lived for some years in Massachusetts and there made many friends. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. J. D. McPhee. The attendance was large in the extreme, considering the disagreeable weather, and bore worthy testimony to the respect and esteem in which the deceased was held by all.

WILLIAM E. GILLESPIE, for the past twenty-five years a printer on the Boston morning papers, died Dec. 4 at his home in Beachmont, after an illness of nearly a year. Mr. Gillespie was 48 years of age, and was born in New London, P. E. I. His parents live at Springhill N.S. He learned the printer's trade in Pictou, N.S., and after working in various cities in Canada and the United States, came to Boston. During his residence there he had worked on all the morning papers—on the Post for the past five years. He was a member of the Knights of Pythias, Fraternal Order of Eagles, Franklin Typographical Society, Typographical Union and the Post and Globe benefit societies. Mr. Gillespie was an exceptionally genial and companionable man, and his death will be mourned by many, more especially of the older generation of printers. He was married about sixteen years ago to Miss Emma Combs, formerly of Charlottetown, who survives him, and who has the sympathy of many friends.

The Rev. William Harrison conducted the solemn and impressive services in his usual sympathetic manner both at the house and at the grave. The pallbearers were Wm. Howard, Lea Howard, James Drake, Wm. Drake, Fred L. Warren and Ernest Stone.

THE S.S. Minto arrived here at 12.45 p. m. yesterday with mail and passengers from Pictou. On the previous day she succeeded while on her way from Charlottetown to Pictou, in taking the disabled steamer Beatrice as far as the entrance to Pictou harbor. The Minto's passengers included Senators Yeo, Robertson and Ferguson returning from Ottawa, Rev. A. J. McNeill, Mr. Fraser of Davis & Fraser, H. S. Crane, Travelling Passenger Agent of the Plant Line and Prof. H. A. Taitou.

THE nomination of candidates for the First District of Queen's in the Provincial Legislature took place yesterday and the following nominations were placed in the hands of High Sheriff Coombs: Murdoch Kennedy of Bradalbane, proposed by John D. Mr. Kennedy is a Conservative candidate, and Mr. Coombs the representative of the Liberal party.
