The medals and trophies have already been ordered and will shortly be on display. In addition to the Track Events there will be a Relay Road Race that will include the most promising athletes of the future. For years past the public of Prince Edward Island have looked to Summerside to supply the sporting attractions for Dominion Day, and this year the whole town is uniting as one in an effort to excel anything previously attempted in this line.

WILL HAVE NONE OF IT

TORONTO. April 2.—Until there is a revised edition of the Toronto public school geography reports it is likely that the Toronto Board of Education will refuse to buy any more of them. The purchase of 650 dozen of the books at sixty cents each has been held up pending a report from their chief inspector, R. H. Cowley, on the alleged errors in the volume. Moncton is described as "the eastern terminus and headquarters of the Canadian National Railways," in the geography.

INVALUABLE SCIENTIFIC WORKS DESTROYED IN A NEW YORK FIRE

NEW YORK. April 2.—Invaluable scientific and historical collections were burned this morning in a fire which nearly destroyed the old Lorillard mansion in Bronx Botanical Park, since 1918 the museum of the Bronx Society of Arts, Science and History. Chief among these were 26,000 lantern slides showing development of various plants and flowers, said to be the only collection of its kind in the world. It was the life work of Dr. Edmund D. Southwick, curator of the park, who was prostrated with grief over the loss, the monetary value of which he estimated at \$30,000. The collection of the Bronx Society of Arts, Science and History, including revolutionary relics army trappings, plate, old books and letters, many of them loaned by individuals, was almost all destroyed either by fire or water. Ten thousand rare coins, however, were only slightly damaged. A collection of volumes now out of print, and pictures relating to Joseph Rodner Drake, and compiled by State Historian Victor Hugo Parisikh, was badly damaged.

Penny Loses His Bout in Halifax

HALIFAX, N. S., April 2.—Edward Healey took a hard ten-round fight from Charlie MacDonald in the main bout of the first card offered by the Halifax Boxing Club at the Auditorium tonight and Harry Lyman, of Moncton, scored a knockout over Earl Penny of St. John, in the second round of what was to have been a ten-round semi-wind-up. Healey and MacDonald are Halifax men. The Healey-MacDonald fight was a hard bout all the way, but Healey had a wide margin at the end. The Lyman-Penny fight started fast and had all the earmarks of a good one. Penny took the first round by a shade and produced a wicked right hand that staggered Lyman several times. The little Monctonian, however, showed willingness to trade slams and eventually managed to get in close about the middle of the second stanza to put over the haymaker. Penny showed all kinds of class and was winning until just before the end. After going to the mat, Penny moved at the count of four. He was trying to get up at eight, but could not and collapsed. He was taken to his corner and came round quickly.

800 Hebrideans For The Dominion

MONTREAL, April 2.—That 800 Hebrideans will arrive in Canada at the end of April to settle in Ontario is the statement of Rev. John Chisholm, who arrived here today after a visit to the British Isles and Europe. Mr. Chisholm is a director of the British Immigration Aid Society and has been investigating conditions in the Old Country with a view to furthering the work of the Society he represents.

DEVELOPING WATER POWER

TIMMINS, April 3.—The Ontario Government has granted the request of Hollinger for a site on the Abitibi River for the purpose of developing power, according to President N. A. Timmins of the Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines, Ltd. While no definite site was named, the letter from the Attorney-General states it will be at Island Portage or Long Sault, and in either case the opportunities presented will be sufficient to meet the Hollinger needs. At the former, 30,000 horse power or better could be developed, while the latter offers opportunity for development of 25,000 horsepower.

THOUGHT WOLVES GOT HIM, TURNS UP SAFE

PRINCE ALBERT, Sask., April 2.—The romantic story of the death of Carl Lynn, a famous trapper and musher of the Northland who was reported to have been attacked by wolves has received a knockout by the arrival of Lynn safe and sound at Ile A La Crosse. A telegram received here today by Inspector Tait of the Provincial Police from his detachment at Ile A La Crosse says: "Carl Lynn arrived here safely last week."

Prince of Wales Competes With Professionals

LONDON, April 2.—The Prince of Wales' love for steeplechasing is causing public anxiety owing to the frequency with which he meets mishaps. Wales himself however, makes little of his risks. The Evening Standard today says wide comment has been provoked in society circles and that the feeling prevails that the Prince's advisers should prevail upon him in view of the responsibility of his position to confine himself to hunting, leaving the jumps for other people. The heir apparent had another mishap today when, participating with Prince George in the Melton steeplechase and riding in the Ladies' Plate, his mount, "Little Christy," was brought down by the balking of another horse at the seventh fence. After six unsuccessful attempts to get his mount over, the Prince gave it up. The Prince also for the first time competed against professional jockeys in an open race, and came in fourth after a narrow escape from being unseated.

St. John Man in Boston Marathon

ST. JOHN, N.B., March 29.—St. John will be represented in the Boston Marathon which takes place on April 19. George Spragg has sent in his entry, and will leave on April 3 for the "Hub" to complete his training. He has been working hard for the last ten weeks and is in excellent condition. The distance, twenty-five miles, is longer than he has covered, but he has had considerable experience in middle-distance racing, and has covered the fifteen-mile distance in good time. His friends expect that he will make a good showing in the classic. He will have a fortnight at Boston to put the finishing touches on his training and will get an opportunity to go over the course. Spragg will run under the Y.M.C.I. colors.

British Government Has Large Surplus

(Special to The Guardian.)
LONDON, April 2.—The extreme difficulty experienced by chancellors of the Exchequer after the war in estimating correctly the nation's accounts a year ahead, was shown by the figures for the financial year ended March 31st. Instead of a surplus of between six and seven million pounds sterling, as estimated by the former chancellor Sir Robert Horne the surplus actually exceeds £101,000,000 which by law goes automatically to the reduction of the national debt unless parliament should pass a special act disposing of it otherwise. This big surplus is mainly due to unexpectedly large reductions in expenditures the chief savings being under the heading of civil service which cost approximately £287,000,000 as compared with estimates of £450,000,000, and defence services of £111,000,000 as compared with an estimated £190,000,000.

LADY ASTOR HOSTESS AT A BIG RECEPTION

LONDON, April 2.—At Lady Astor's big reception today to Members of Parliament and representatives of women's organizations, Frau Schreiber, Socialist member of the German Reichstag climbed up on a chair and told the company of "The wrongs inflicted on Germany by France" and "The hardships and sufferings now being endured in Germany because of French invasion of the Ruhr." The hostess in introducing the speaker laughingly told the guests they could take what Frau Schreiber said "with a grain of salt" and "only believe half." But Frau Schreiber seemed to think what she had to say too serious for jest. She began with the assertion that as an international Socialist and Pacifist, she was an absolutely impartial critic. Her audience was frankly startled when she said "France is building airplanes with money she got from German reparations." This referred to recent statements here about French air supremacy.

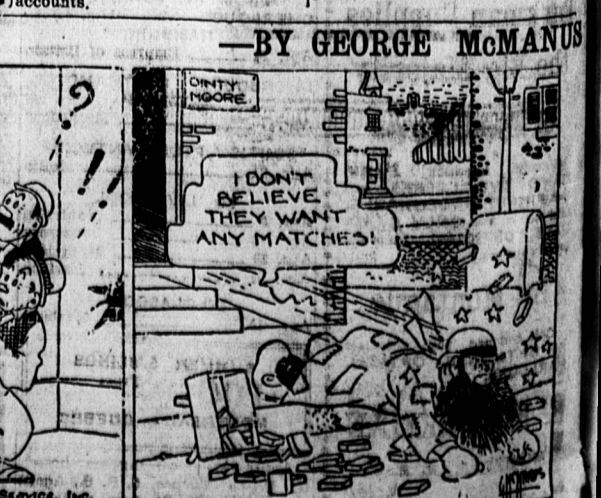

SHIPPING WAS BRISK
TORONTO, April 3.—A record-breaking year is reported by Harbor-Master Allen in his report on the activities at the port of Toronto during the year 1922. The number of steamships arriving and departing in 1922 was 3,242 with a gross tonnage of 4,486,212, as compared with 3,030, with gross tonnage of 4,129,268 in 1921.
LONDON, April 3.—The young Earl of Northesk and Miss Jessica Brown, formerly of the Ziegfeld Follies, today admitted they are engaged, according to the Evening News. The paper says the wedding may take place very soon. "We have not decided the date," declared the Earl, "and I suppose the engagement is still unofficial but we will certainly be married whatever happens."
Miss Brown declined to discuss details, saying she is sailing for the United States on the Olympic tomorrow to see her parents in Buffalo. She added she wanted them to hear of her engagement from herself first. The young actress came to London to star in a cabaret here.
Her fiancée, who will not be twenty-two until next September is an officer in the Coldstream Guards. He succeeded to his title in 1921 and the \$750,000 estate his father left. Northesk is a Scottish earldom.
"Almost simultaneous with the report of the engagement came the news that the Earl had been slightly injured in an automobile smash early this morning. He will probably be confined to his house for several days."
SYDNEY CITY FUNDS SHORT.
SYDNEY, N. S., April 2.—Shortage of some \$5,000 in city funds is alleged in the report made by Robert Carter, chartered accountant, who recently completed an audit of Sydney's civic books. There is no charge of dishonesty on the part of any civic employee but the alleged shortage is understood to be attributed to lack of a proper system of handling civic accounts.
