IN MEMORIAM

THE LATE MISS HAVILAND

As an early hour yesterday morning at her late residence, "Ayna Cottage" 40 Upper Prince Street, there passed into the unseen world one of Charlottetown's oldest and beloved citizens, Eleanor Blanche Haviland. She was born in Charlottetown in 1868 and was in her eighty-fifth year, and was the surviving member of a family who for several generations occupied prominent places in the public and social life of this Province. Her father, the Hon. Thomas Heath Haviland, was a former Lieutenant-Governor of this province and one of the Fathers of Confederation. Miss Haviland was a true Christian lady of the old school. The Church and the work of God came first with her. She was a devoted member and a generous supporter of St. Peter's Cathedral, but her devotion and generosity extended to the Church at large, especially in mission work. For many years she was the loyal Secretary of the Women's Auxiliary of the Church of the English, and gave freely of her time and money for the advancement of this great work. She was one of the charter members of the Royal Edward Chapter of the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire. Miss Haviland will be greatly missed. The remembrance of her kind and gentle spirit will long be cherished by her relatives and many friends. "Rest eternal grant unto her, O Lord, and let light perpetual shine upon her."

HEALTH

A HEALTH SERVICE OF THE CANADIAN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION AND LIFE INSURANCE COMPANY OF CANADA

Canadian industrial health authorities point out that the clearly defined role of medical service in industry is to maintain the health of the workers and to prevent ordinary illness as well as occupational sickness and accidents.

Employers in general have for some time recognized the advisability of providing certain services for all workers. These examinations are the means of ascertaining the physical qualifications of prospective employees and of fitting them to jobs where they will not experience discomfort or cause injury to themselves, to others, or to property.

Physical examinations are especially significant during wartime, when manpower in industry is to be conservatively conserved.

"Already," says an official of the Industrial Hygiene Division, Ontario Department of Health, "there is a shortage in certain skilled groups. This is likely to become more acute as overtime work for women and excessive hours worked by some men. Industrial man-power must not be wasted with output unnecessarily curtailed."

Re-examination of industrial workers at appropriate intervals has been found advisable and in most cases very necessary. Periodic examination or "continuous health supervision" has been found to have a two-fold advantage:

1. Early diagnosis of disease or defect.
2. Helping the employee to maintain regularity of work.

Where hazards of occupational disease exist, periodic examination has proved to be an effective safeguard in showing up any ill effects, thereby permitting the correction of condition at the source of exposure. Health authorities feel that in a similar manner it will also have a definite value in controlling general illness among industrial workers.

"The cold bug is highly contagious. He is responsible for more loss of time from work than any other cause. He says your vitality and often leads to more serious illness, such as influenza or pneumonia."

Thus reads a pamphlet called "The Cold Facts" just issued by the Industrial Division, Health League.
