

"BIG THREES" AND OTHERS

The present craze for designating
all sorts of combinations and enter-
prises in terms of numbers, with the
adjective "big" prefixed, is by no
means new.

Moltke, so long ago as 1871, coined
the phrase "Big Three" in allusion
to the French fortresses of Strass-
burg, Metz, and Verdun. "With this
Big Three in our possession our
safety is assured," he said at the Ver-
sailles Peace Conference. He got his
will so far as the first two were con-
cerned, but failed, as regards the
third, luckily for France, and the
world at large.

To-day we find the newspapers
using the phrase Big Three to desig-
nate three individuals—Clemenceau,
Wilson and Lloyd George; and three
affiliated trade unions—those repre-
senting the railwaymen, miners and
transport workers.

Similarly, the Big Five, a term
borrowed from America, means over
there the combination of the five
great meat packing firms—Swift, Ar-
mour, and the rest—which together
constitute the American Meat Trust
while it was also used over here
when the Coalition Government was
formed to designate its then lead-
ing lights—Lloyd George, Bonar Law,
Arthur Henderson, and Lords Milne
and Curzon.

THE NEW EMBROIDERIES.

More handwork is being done on
frocks than ever, it seems, but this
embroidery is not being confined to
wools or silks. There is a lot of
straw embroidery, the straw being
the soft, silky kind of a pliable
rivaling raffa. Particularly good for
hats, bags and Summer frocks gen-
erally is this straw work, says the
North American of Philadelphia.

Then one sees a lot of ribbon em-
broidery. Indeed, the ribbon for this
work can be bought by the spool in
all the new bright shades. It, too, is
very soft and more like the bund-
ling wrapping ribbon to be seen a
Christmas time. Wide girdles or
frocks are showing a single flow-
worked out with the colored ribbon
either directly embroidered through
the material or touched on with silk
or other ribbon.

**CARDINAL'S PRAISE
FOR SALVATIONISTS**

Cardinal Gibbons, in a letter made
public yesterday by Charles S. Whit-
man, formerly Governor of the State,
gave unstinted praise to the Salvation
Army services rendered to the men

of the army, navy and marine corps
during the war. Cardinal Gibbons de-
clared himself as happy to comment
the efforts of these volunteer workers.
His Eminence referred to the liberal
spirit which persuades the Salvation
Army and expressed the hope that the
campaign to raise \$13,000,000 for their
annual budget will meet with a hearty
reponse from the generous American
public.

Cardinal Gibbons' letter said in part
"Every returning trooper is a wel-
ling witness to the efficient and gen-
erous work of the Salvation Army,
both at the front and in the camp-

at home. I am sure the more help
to command this organization, be-
cause it is free from sectarian bias.
The one in need of help is the desti-
tute of their effort, with never a question
of his creed or color."
In replying to Cardinal Gibbons, M-
Whitman said, the Salvation Army is
honored by this recognition of its pur-
poses and ideals. "One word will a

man wrote.

**RAW EGGS CURE
CALF DIARRHOEA**

Diarrhoea is the most common form
of calf troubles met with in hand-
led calves. As stated, much of it
can be prevented by sanitary meth-
ods of handling the feeding pails, al-
though it is occasionally met with in
spite of all precautions. We have
had a good many cases of this and
have never lost a calf yet. We always
begin treatment in the earliest stag-
es of the disorder. We give two raw
eggs as soon as the first symptoms
of the trouble are noticed, and then
one egg eight and morning until the
diarrhoea is over. It might be sup-
posed that if raw eggs will cure diar-
rhoea that too many would cause
fiveness, but such is not the case.
Soon as a normal condition of the
calf is restored, the eggs have no
effect.

His treatment never fails if begun
in time. If bowel troubles are not cor-
rected at once, the passages soon be-
come filled with blood and the dis-
order assumes a form of dysentery.
Before it reaches this stage is
corrected, but treatment is at times
difficult. Give corrosive sublimate,
one pint of water, shaken
in one pint of water, shaken
in one pint of water. One table-
spoonful of this solution is given twice
a day until cured. A druggist should
always mix this prescription. Cor-
rosive sublimate is a deadly irritant
poison, and extreme care must be ex-
ercised in its use. Calves suffering
with bowel disorders must be kept
warm and dry at any season of the
year, and not exposed to the weather.

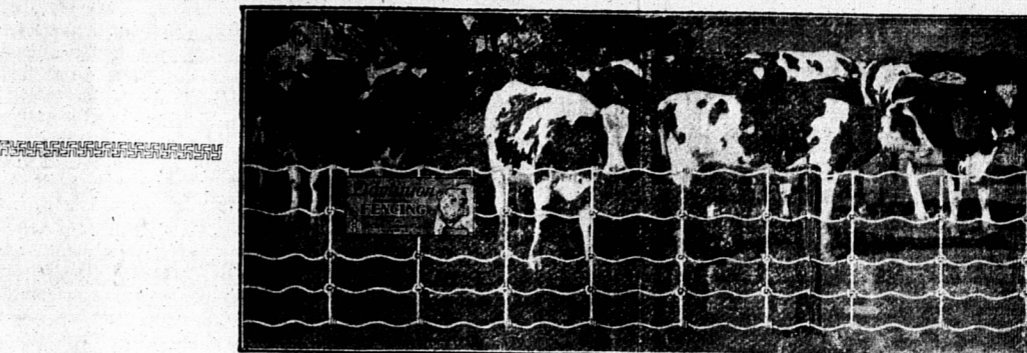
ROSES WHICH NEVER FADE

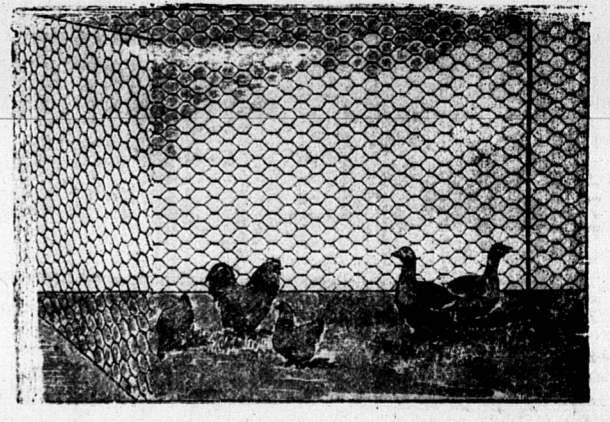
