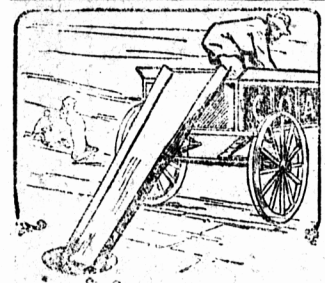

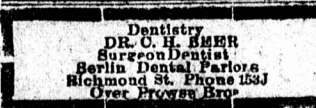

### STUDENTS OF JOURNALISM

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—Working from dawn to midnight is what most of the students in the Pulitzer School of Journalism have found to be part of the training for a newspaper job. The work in the school is not the snap that they supposed it would be. Both the second and third classes have to take regular assignments in practical reporting and their hours come at all times of the day and night.

### HARVESTERS' EXCURSION.

Despatches from the Western Prairie Provinces state there is a still great demand for labor, and the farmers are paying the highest wages for helpers for harvest hands. The work of garnering the immense crop, is not half completed, and as this work must be completed within the next

two or three months there is demand for a greater number of extra helpers than the West cannot begin to supply. The Canadian Pacific Railway has been requested to arrange for a Harvesters Excursion to run from St. John on October 14th. The rate from St. John and points on the line of the Canadian Pacific in New Brunswick to Winnipeg will be \$12.00 going and \$18.00 returning. Excursionists from other points in the Maritime Provinces will make their own way to St. John or nearest junction point. This excursion will give the farmers of the East an excellent opportunity to see the West, where those desiring can obtain employment at excellent wages.

### I KNOW HIM.

The name comes from the Castle of Wettin, near Magdeburg, which claimed Wittkind as the founder of the race.
