NEW GLASGOW GREAT HARBORS

Great harbors are common enough the world over. They have come to be looked upon as an integral part of every industrial centre. Most of them indeed possess natural advantages which commend them to those ship-owners whose crafts plow every sea. But nature did nothing in that respect for the communities that have scattered hereabouts. Taken altogether, they may some day form the Pittsburgh of Canada. At the moment, however, they have no shipping facilities by water that would assist them in the slightest degree; only a single line of railway is at their command.

But no one need expect conditions such as these to long remain. Already the federal government has dredged at work creating an immense basin at Trenton—a town two miles to the north—and in the course of another year, ocean liners will be in a position to dock right at the works of the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company and at those of the Eastern Car Company, which are immediately contiguous.

POSSIBILITIES

The series of towns in this locality undoubtedly have everything to expect from the future, and if one may bank upon the men who have, in scarcely more than a single generation, built up a great iron and steel organization more than a mere country forge, those now in the prime of life may live to see skyscrapers rearing their heads amid the undulating hills of Pictou county.

Heretofore the town has been governed by a Board of Assessors of which G. A. Aitken is chairman, W. W. Jenkins, Treasurer and Andrew Lavers Secretary. There are a number of names mentioned in connection with the Mayoralty including G. A. Aitken, W. W. Jenkins, Dr. D. A. Stewart, J. D. Stewart, A. J. Macdonald, Seymour Knight, R. R. Jenkins, J. C. Manuel, A. Lavers, and other well known townsmen. Under the new condition of things Georgetown will have over twice as much money to expend as formerly and will have more work to do including the up-keep of the streets. There are a number of improvements which the Mayor and Council will have to face, and one of the crying needs of the place is street lighting as Georgetown is sadly lacking in this important matter. A publicity campaign in order to make the superb attractions of the town as a summer resort better known, and the adoption of measures tending to secure that long expected, and long delayed steam ferry on Cardigan River, are among problems which may well engage the attention of His Worship the Mayor and Councillors.—F. HUGH DRYDOCK FORMALLY OPENED

MONTREAL, Nov. 18.—The Duke of Connaught formally opened the huge floating ship dock, which bears his name and which is now in the basin prepared for her at Maisonneuve, at noon to-day. A special train with the duke's private car attached arrived from Ottawa at the dock at 11.15. There were on board, besides the governor-general, the minister of marine and fisheries, Hon. J. D. Haven, as well as other ministers and members of the vice-regal staff. The president of the harbor commission presented an address to the duke on behalf of the board, and after the Duke of Connaught had replied he declared the dock open and ready for use. The commissioners issued over 1,000 invitations to leading citizens to be present at the ceremony. In declaring the dock formally open for business, the duke expressed the hope that in the present generation Canadian commerce would be carried under the flag of a Canadian merchant fleet of vessels built in Canadian shipyards.

STATE OPPOSE THE LABOR PROGRAMME

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Nov. 18.—The exclusion of state railways and other state municipal undertakings from federal parliamentary interference is regarded to be a certainty shortly, following the decrease of opposition which has been shown in the house of representatives.

The Liberal associations of the Commonwealth have announced their determination to fight against the labor government's proposals to be given more power to deal with industrial trouble. The Liberals argue that these proposals would mean the granting of undue powers to the federal legislature. One of the most noteworthy features of its opposition is the decision of the New South Wales parliament to oppose the federal labor government's proposals.

DAVIE, "BOY BROKER" SUING FOR PARDON

BOSTON, Nov. 18.—The pardon committee of the executive council is considering a petition for the pardon of Robert E. Davie, known as the "boy broker," whose financial operations finally caused his conviction. Davie has served about twenty months of his five years' sentence at Deer Island. Serious ill-health is the reason urged for his liberation at this time.

Councillor McGregor has taken a deep interest in the matter, chiefly because of the mother's pleadings and the serious condition of young Davie, and he earnestly urged the pardon committee to report favorably on the matter.

Davie sets forth in his petition that his health has been steadily failing and that his nervous system has completely broken down. He states that he fully recognizes his wrong-doing and sincerely repents. He has a sincere desire to make restitution and "will not leave a stone unturned until everybody has been paid in full." He denies that he has secreted any funds and swears under oath that he has turned over every cent to his creditors. In his petition, he makes the declaration that in the future he will lead a sober and industrious life. The petition is signed by William H. Jackson, who was a victim to the extent of \$70,000, by Mrs. Hannah L. Greenwood, wife of a Somerville minister, who also lost by reason of Davie's transactions.

Councillor Alexander McGregor, speaking in behalf of the petition for the pardon said that the mother of the young man had been to see him almost every week, and that his interest is brought about by the urgent pleadings of the mother. He said that he has ascertained from Dr. Sullivan of the Prison Hospital that the normal temperature of Davie in the early morning is 98 degrees, and toward the afternoon rises to 103 and above. He is subject to constant headaches and has been in the hospital the last twelve weeks. The consensus of opinion among the doctors at the institution is that Davie is a victim of tuberculosis.

Councillor McGregor said his personal opinion was that Davie would not live a very long while. In consultation with District Attorney Pelletier he is reported to have stated that while he would oppose the pardon if it was alleged that the sentence was
