S., going to Winona, Wash., instead of Winona, Mich., Fulda Aart, aged twenty, a pretty Finnish maiden, and her brother, John, ten years old, arrived at the former place to find only strangers at the station, strange people, strange customs and none who knew their tongue. Garbed in the showy gala peasant costumes of their native country they wandered about the town with their bundles. Finally an interpreter was found and through him the mistake was discovered.

They were returned to Spokane by railroad officials who took up the case. The girl and her brother have departed for Winona, Mich., where friends await them. When the mistake was fully explained to her by an interpreter the young woman smiled she was glad of the trip and that the only inconvenience was to her friends.

THE VALUE OF POVERTY.
(Universalist Leader.)

There is a very general feeling today that the abolition of poverty will mean the abolition of nearly if not quite every evil; that if the burden of poverty be lifted from the shoulders of men, then will men straighten themselves up and walk in the path of righteousness. It is doubtful if there is any ground for this belief to stand upon. Experience has not shown the redeeming power of money, whether it be counted in vast sums or in a competency; nor has the absence of money, even poverty, been of itself fruitful of righteousness. In fact, the verdict of human history is that life in its highest and best definition, can come from one or the other condition and is in a large measure independent of both. When David Livingstone erected a memorial stone for his beloved parents one line of the inscription read, "For poor and pious parents." When he was asked if he did not mean, "poor, but pious parents?" he said no, for he was thankful for their poverty. He recognized the real source of his own power. And there will be no more important lesson to be learned, during the centennial of his birth than his emancipation of this most common condition of the children of man from the bondage of misunderstanding.
