THE LATE ARCHIBALD KENNEDY.

Though he had long since passed the allotted span of life universal regret was felt and expressed on the announcement yesterday afternoon that Archibald Kennedy had passed away from life's activities. The sad event was not altogether unexpected as it had been known for some days that he was seriously ill.

Mr. Kennedy was born in Greenock, Scotland in 1816. In earlier life he followed the sea and became a captain in the merchant service. While yet a young man he came to Prince Edward Island and established a sail-making business to which about the year 1865 a ship chandlery was added, the business under the firm name of A. Kennedy & Co. being still continued at the foot of Queen Street. To his business he gave earnest and energetic attention and it prospered in his hands. His name in the business world was always a synonym for uprightness and integrity.

He was called at various times to hold important public positions, always without seeking them. He served several terms in the City Council as the representative of Ward One, and several terms on the School Board and also as Trustee for the Prince Edward Island Hospital.

In church work he was long active and devoted, filling successively the offices of Superintendent of the Sunday School, Trustee and Elder in St. James Church. He was always a most liberal contributor to the support of church work, and the various religious and philanthropic enterprises. Missions were dear to his heart and his liberal contributions helped to support them in China, India and in French evangelization in Quebec.

Mr. Kennedy married in early life Miss McLaren, who like himself had been born in Scotland and came with her father, a shipbuilder, to Cape Traverse. After sharing his joys and sorrows for many years she died some three years ago. The deceased gentleman was one of nature's noblemen, kind hearted, a friend to the poor, a liberal supporter of every good cause, good citizen and a faithful Christian. His memory will long be cherished by all who had the privilege of his acquaintance.

In another column appears the very favorable annual statement of the Bank of New Brunswick, the oldest incorporated bank in the Dominion. It was founded in 1820, and has within its field the very highest standing as a financial institution. It has successfully weathered the storms which have swept the monetary world during three generations and has gone on prospering and to prosper. Since 1886 it has paid annual dividends of 12 per cent. A. E. Williams is the popular and capable Manager of the Charlotte town branch.

If our Island representatives who support the Laurier Government had the courage to say, "Give us a special train to connect between the Island Railway and the Government steamer that carries the mails, or we will resign our seats," no one will doubt that the special would have been forthcoming. If by any chance the Government had cared to still refuse the reasonable request and the representatives would resign in consequence no one would doubt their triumphant reelection. But the courage to stand up manfully and take a very little risk in defence of Island rights seems to be wanting.

The Patriot rises to remark that "the Laurier Government has not only shown great capacity, but is absolutely free from reproach. . . Each Minister has been singularly successful in the administration of his own department," and much more of the same sort. This we can endorse in the larger sense as applicable to the Dominion. But exception surely must be taken so far as the winter service and especially the mail service between the Island and the Mainland is concerned. And unfortunately for us these are very vital matters for every citizen of Prince Edward Island. In these matters very little "capability" has been shown during the past two months, and we are sorry to say the Ministers chiefly concerned cannot be held free from "reproach," unless on the ground that they have been badly advised by the Island representatives who support them.
