INDIAN AMBULANCES

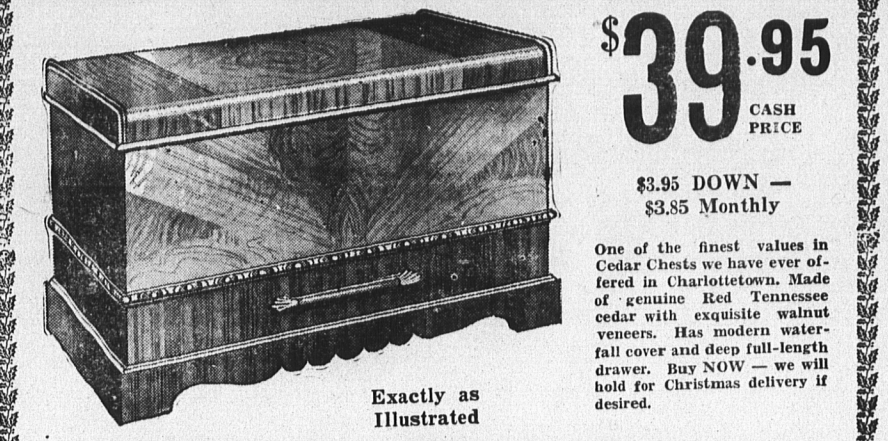

Declares Plaut Was satisfied With CBC policy

MONTREAL, Dec. 8—(CP) — Rene Morin, chairman of the board of governors of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, in a statement yesterday dealing with criticisms of the Corporation's internal organization made by Alan B. Plaut, said Mr. Plaut was a member of the board for nearly four years, during which he appeared to be in full agreement with the policies of the Corporation.

Mr. Morin, in his 400-word statement, added: "The extent and the violence of his recent denunciations leave the impression that public interest is not the only motive behind them."

The statement follows tabling in the House of Commons Friday of correspondence relating to Mr. Plaut's resignation, accepted Oct. 3, from the Corporation's board of governors.

Mr. Morin's statement here yesterday said the CBC, "though conscious of the work that it has performed so far, does not claim to have reached perfection."

Though Mr. Plaut's reports were presented to the board in the middle of October, 1939, the statement went on, Mr. Plaut was not in a position to give the complementary information which he had announced was necessary for their proper interpretation, before the end of June, 1940.

After that, Mr. Morin said, there had been one regular meeting of the board in August, where attention was taken up by the newscast

GERMANS CLAIM SHIPS SUNK

BERLIN, Dec. 8—(AP)—A German high command communique Sunday said: "A submarine sank two enemy merchant ships with a total of 17,000 tons, and another submarine sank two more, including a 12,000-ton tanker, including a 9,000-ton tanker. (The claims brought no British comment.)"
