Book Notice

"A Prairie Parson," by R. W. Campbell, author of "Spind Top, Out West." This is a good book. It purports to be the autobiography of a Presbyterian Minister who lived and worked in Canada when Ontario was for the most part forest and the great prairies of our country still, for the most part uncultivated. The narrative is well written; and the scenes in lumber camp and prairie farms and village life in the days of the first settlers highly graphic and interesting. The war waged by the churches and other good influences against the "saloon boss" and the libertine with other influences toward evil exerted in a young country, is vividly described; and the gradual improvement of conditions is well set forth. The writer has evidently known "them" himself, and there is much of what Sam Slick called "human nature" depicted in a way that will at once interest, please and edify the reader. Added to the main story there are in the volume, two chapters entitled "The Heart Mender," showing how domestic difficulties were overcome in the new land by means of "soft sawder and religion." The book is altogether one that we can heartily recommend.

Churchill Replies To His Critics

LONDON, Aug. 6.—Great Britain's return to the gold standard which during recent weeks has drawn forth a swelling though dispirited chorus of adverse criticism from various sources, was staunchly defended today in the House of Commons by Right Hon. Winston Churchill, Chancellor of the Exchequer. Unquestionably, Mr. Churchill declared the standard affected everything to a certain degree and any one could argue from that fact that everything disagreeable which had happened since the gold standard was restored was due to its increase. But disagreeable things always were happening, he remarked. He then asked the Government to be judged not by fluctuations occurring over short periods but by its value in the long run. "If England had not taken the action she did," the Chancellor continued, "the British Empire would have taken it without us and come to a gold standard, not of the pound sterling but of the dollars." The Chancellor said he was cognizant of the criticisms and propaganda against the gold standard. But he pointed out that the critics discredited themselves and that no political party had challenged the Government to action. "I do not know," he said, "whether the Government was entirely unopposed." The immediate inspiration of the Chancellor's statement was a speech by the Labor member, Mr. Smith, who said the return to the gold standard was more responsible than anything else for the re-
