THE REICHSSTAG MEMBERS ABOVE MARTIAL LAW

BERLIN, May 17.—Notwithstanding the fact that the Empire is ruled by martial law, the constitutional rights of members of the Reichstag cannot be abridged. This was shown by declarations made by Vice-Chancellor Delbrueck to the budget committee of the Reichstag in answering queries of Socialists touching two of their members. Herr Haese explained that action had been begun in a military court against Dr. Karl Liebknecht for making statements of a political nature and that his comrades had been forbidden to speak to him under a penalty, the vice chancellor replied that such a process was not illegal and that the government had interviewed immediately to have it discontinued.

GERMANS TIED TO LOOPHOLES

A private of the Seaforth Highlanders, writing to a friend in Belgium, says: "I am keeping Al, and the weather has improved such a lot that things have a much brighter appearance. It is almost daylight at 4.30 a. m. now, and that makes the nights much shorter, which means a great deal to the man in the trench. We have been out in the trenches and are going in tonight. It is getting a very risky thing now getting in or out. The days are longer and often the moon is shining brightly. We had a German machine-gun turned on us last time, but we escaped by getting down flat on our faces. We are seeing some curious things now in the enemy's lines. Fancy tying men to the loopholes, where they can be seen and fired on. Yet we are able to count five such cases. I think most of the German rank and file are 'fed up' with the war, and are being punished for trying to desert. We are well fortified

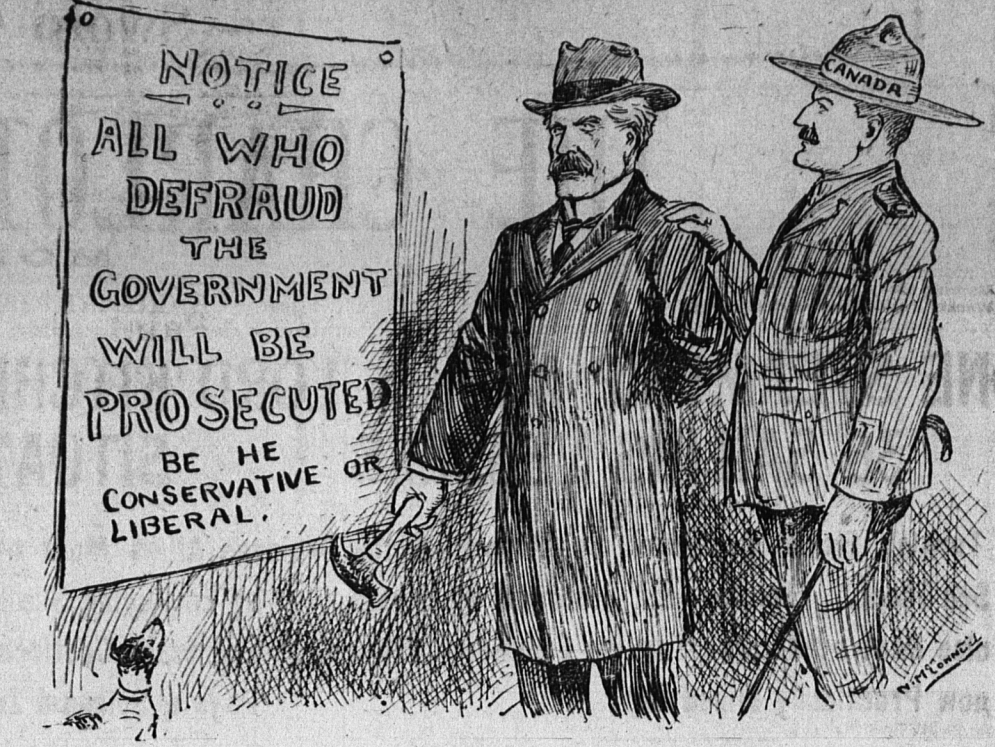

and the men in the trenches are in the best of fettle, and just in the mood for a scrap after lying low all winter. Some little time ago, just after the fall of Przemysl, we had a notice-board made out in German telling them we had, or rather the Russians had, 120,000 prisoners. The notice finished by asking them if they would surrender now, or wait and meet the same fate. As the distance between the trenches is only 150 yards, the notice could easily be read with the aid of field-glasses, so you see we are having some fun with them at the same time. I don't think the war will last much longer.

40,000 FOR BASE HOSPITAL. TORONTO, May 15.—A. C. Hardy, of Brockville, has donated \$40,000 towards the Toronto University base hospital.

RECOVER BODY OF MISS GWEN ALLAN, ONE OF LUSITANIA VICTIMS. QUEENSTOWN, May 17.—The body of Miss Gwen Allan, daughter of Lady Allen of Montreal, was brought in today by the tug Flying Fox. The tug had eight other bodies on board—three men two women, two small boys and a year-old child, none of which have been identified.

FELL FROM I. C. R. TRAIN NEAR TRURO AND WAS KILLED. DIGBY, N. S., May 17.—The body will arrive here tomorrow of the late Margaret Milligan, which was found on the I. C. R. track near Truro yesterday. Miss Milligan was a passenger from Halifax for Glenholm to visit her brother Rev. Frank Milligan, pastor of the Presbyterian church in that town, who intended meeting his sister. How she met her death is unknown but it is presumed

that she fell from the train while crossing from one car to another while the train was in motion. The deceased was highly respected young lady of 28 years of age.

She is survived by her mother, Mrs. Frank Jones, of Bear River, who was formerly a St. John lady, one brother, as stated above, and one sister, wife of Walter M. Roman, manager of the Royal Bank of Canada at Bear River and several half brothers and sisters. Internment will take place in Forest Hill cemetery, Digby, tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock. The services will be conducted by Rev. William Driffield Rector of Holy Trinity church.
