Unable to Make the Trip on Account of the Very Heavy Ice.

The Northumberland started on her first trip for Pt. du Chene at 10.15 o'clock yesterday morning and when three miles west of Cape Egmont, heavy ice was met. The Captain steered her northward with the hope of getting her around the fields, and ran as far as West Cape, thence in a southeasterly direction close around the ice and down as far as Cassie's Cape. Here the ice was found to be solid and very heavy. Once a lead was struck and there were hopes for a time that Pt. du Chene would be reached, but this was impossible and the ship was turned about

THE Schooners in Cascumpee Harbor are being fitted out for the season.—Capt. John Champion of the schooner Sarah P. Ayr intends making his first trip as usual to the Magdalene Islands.—The Bay is now quite clear of ice, the first craft this season sailed across it on Thursday last.—The Alberton Dairying Association are enlarging their factory for the coming season.—An extension of 24 ft is being built to it, making its dimensions in all including the boiler shed, 80 by 28 ft.—Mr. Peter McFarlane, Inspector of Bait Freezers was in Alberton the greater part of last week.

In view of the much discussed winter route and the annoying delays in our present mail service via Picton the following comparison of the time made on the different routes taken from the Pioneer, will be of interest:—Mail by I. C. R. train leaves Montreal at 1 p. m., and arrives at Sackville 12 noon, Picton 10.30 p. m., Charlottetown, 6.30 p. m., 53 hours 30 minutes, Summerside 9.45 a. m., 63 hours 45 minutes. Via C. P. R., Montreal 9 p. m., Sackville 5 p. m., Picton 3 a. m., Charlottetown 6.30 p. m., 45 hours 30 minutes. Summerside 9.45 a. m., 60 hours 45 minutes. Via Point du Chene, I. C. R. leaves Montreal 1 p. m., arrive at Point du Chene 11 a. m., Charlottetown 3 p. m., 27 hours; Summerside 1 p. m., 25 hours. C. P. R. leaves Montreal 9 p. m., arrive Point du Chene 4 p. m., Charlottetown 9 p. m., 24 hours; Summerside 7 p. m., 22 hours. Via Sackville and Cape Traverse, I. C. R. leave Montreal 1 p. m., arrive Sackville 12 noon, Cape Traverse 3 p. m., Charlottetown 5.30 p. m., 24 1/2 hours; Summerside 3.50 p. m., 23 1/2 hours. C. P. R. leaves Montreal 9 p. m., arrive Sackville 5 p. m., Cape Traverse 7 p. m., Charlottetown 10.30 p. m., 25 1/2 hours; Summerside 3.30 p. m., 23 1/2 hours. The Summerside mails are delayed when via Picton as follows: I. C. R., Truro 3 hours, Picton 1 1/2 hours, Charlottetown 1 1/2 hours, total delay, 32 hours, via C. P. R. Picton 1 1/2 hours, Charlottetown 1 1/2 hours, total delay 24 1/2 hours. Until a faster train is put on between Sackville and Cape Tormentine the Point de Chene route is shorter than the Capes route by 1 1/2 hours. Our readers will be in a position to judge by the above data how the present mail difficulty is accounted for, and where the remedy is to be looked for. The idea of mails travelling 40 to 45 hours for nothing, of passengers being carried 40 to 45 hours out of their course and being compelled to pay for the privilege together with a reasonable sum for their board will not commend itself to intelligent readers. The public are fortunately beginning to see this matter in its true light, and we trust that ere long with the privileges available a better condition of affairs will be established.

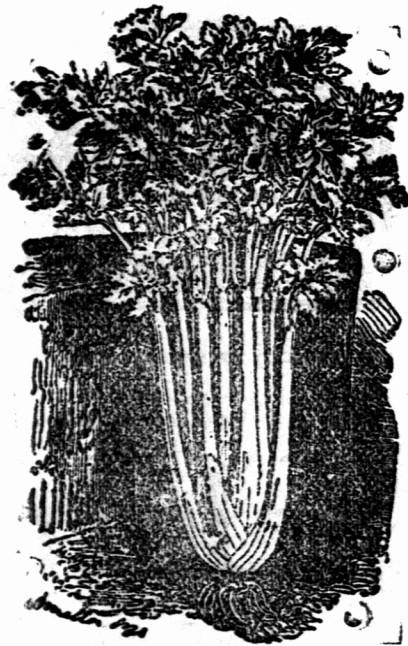

# REMOVAL

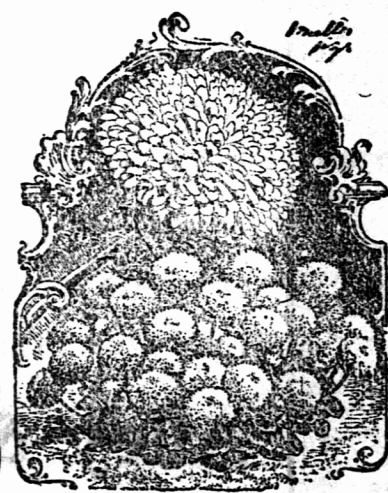
