KILLED IN ACTION

Mr. Simon Murchison of Pinette, has received the following reference to the death of his son, Mr. Murchison, second son of Angus has been in France since early in the war being now commander of a machine gun section with the 2nd Battery.

Headquarters, Royal Mounted Regiment, 14th Canadian Battalion, August 19th, 1918

Mr. Simon Murchison, Pinette, P. E. I., Canada

Dear Sir:—You have probably been informed before this of the death of your son, No. 712858, Private John Malcolm Murchison, who was killed in action during a successful operation in which this unit was engaged on August 8th, 1918.

Your son was a splendid soldier and I can assure you that his loss is sadly felt by all of us, and especially his close friends of whom he had many. Canada has lost still another good soldier, and all of us a very brave comrade.

As time grows older and Peace is again restored, I trust that the fact of your dear son, who sacrificed his all for his King and Country, and bravely met a hero's death, will somewhat assuage the grief and anguish you have to bear.

To you, Sir and to all your family, I extend the heartfelt sympathies of all ranks of the Royal Montreal Regiment.

MAJOR ATWOOD McKAY

Great regret is being generally expressed throughout the Province over the death of wounds of Major

Atwood McKay, who will be remembered as one of the finest soldiers that ever left this Province. A son of the late Donald McKay, of Montague, he enlisted early in the war and sailed from Montreal in December 1914 with a draft of artillery officers.

After being in England for some months he joined the 12th Battery C. F. A. as Captain and went with that battery to France. In 1916 he was promoted to the command of a 4.5. Howitzer Battery, C. F. A. He made a record for himself for bravery and efficiency, was mentioned several times in despatches, recommended for the D. S. O. and later promoted to Lieut. Colonel in the field. He was wounded a few months ago in the hand, but refused to go to the rear to have it dressed, stating that things were too interesting to leave. He was later wounded by a high explosive in the leg and head and wrote his friends that he thought he would pull through with perhaps the loss of one leg. He died however while on the operating table closing a career of great promise. It is stated by some that his battalion made more direct hits at the enemy than any other battalion in Canada.
