PIQUANTE SAUCE

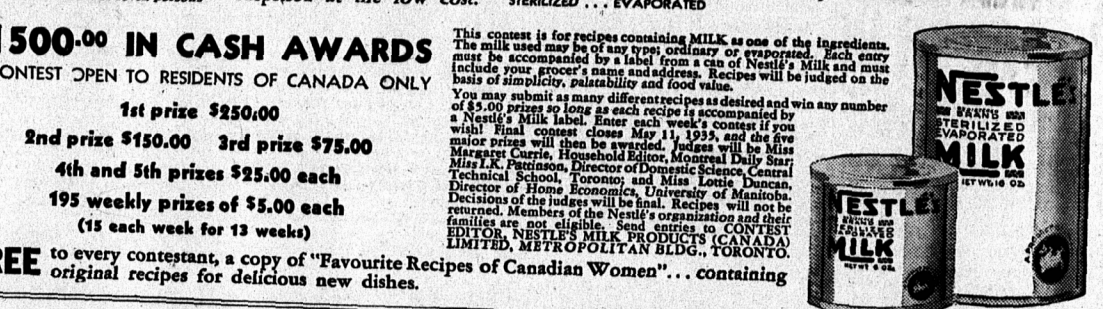
