**PRODUCE**

**MONTREAL, July 6**—A slight drop in butter prices constituted the only change on the Montreal dairy produce market today, all other lines holding steady. Speculative demand for butter, which pushed prices higher recently, was lacking and the market eased under the lighter demand. No 1 butter in cartons or less ended the day at 20 1/2 cents a pound off a quarter of a cent from yesterday. Offerings totaled only 87 boxes.  
 The cheese market held steady at 11 to 11 1/2 cents for Ontario cheese, with Quebec cheese half a cent under these levels. A total of 1,133 boxes was offered for sale.  
 Eggs were firm after a slight easiness yesterday. Graded shipments in cartons held at 20 to 20 1/2 cents a dozen for extras, 16 to 16 1/2 for first and 13 to 13 1/2 for seconds. Arrivals amounted to 853 boxes.  
 Old potatoes also were unchanged. New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island green mountains selling for \$1.20 to \$1.25.

**CURRENCY**

**MONTREAL, July 6**—With the pound sterling soaring over par for the first time since Great Britain went off the gold standard in September 1931, currencies on Montreal foreign exchanges moved into higher ground today. The United States dollar was weak.  
 The pound sterling was higher at the opening being quoted at \$4.82 1/2 which brought it up to \$4.87 1/2 compared with par of \$4.86 2/3. The reaction set in during late trading and the pound finished the day at \$4.86 1/2, a small fraction under par, but 4 1/2 cents above yesterday's close.  
 The American greenback opened lower at 77 per cent premium but with the rise in sterling it dropped back to a new low at 63 1/2 per cent off par on one per cent. The French franc gained .007 of a cent at 8 1/4 cents.
