THE STIPENDIARY MAGISTRACY.

For some days past a rumor has been current that Mr. McDonald the recently appointed Stipendiary Magistrate of Charlottetown has been or is shortly to be asked to resign that position in order that Mr. S. F. Blanchard may be appointed thereto. This report caused surprise in the first place and has since provoked a good deal of feeling in town and country. It has been intimated, on precisely what authority we do not know, that as Mr. McDonald was not disposed to resign, a threat of his dismissal has been made. This sounds improbable and may not be true, but be that as it may Mr. McDonald's many friends feel pretty strongly that he ought not to resign and will urge him to hold on to the position.

Mr. Blanchard was understood to have been an applicant for a County Judgeship at the time of the last vacancy, and also to have been an aspirant for the position of Stipendiary at the time of Mr. Haszard's resignation. Had it been intended to give him the latter position it would have been much better all around that he had been appointed in the first instance. As it is the general public had accepted the belief that the office was permanently filled, and to make a change such as is said to be contemplated would place the new incumbent in an unsatisfactory position. Of course Mr. Blanchard has his friends who would like to see him occupying an official position with a fair salary. But the general public are naturally distrustful when it is proposed to arbitrarily make a vacancy. Such a change should not be made unless for good public reasons, and not from mere party political motives, or with the sole object of gaining political support in any particular quarter.

Mr. Horace Haszard is clearly entitled to the credit of securing the direct steamer Uluda coming to this port in the near future. Why the Patriot should announce the coming of the steamer and seek to conceal from its readers the fact of Mr. Haszard's agency in securing her service for this route can easily be imagined. But the attempted concealment will be altogether ineffectual, as the general public have otherwise been made aware that this year as in previous years Mr. Haszard has been the energetic and successful promoter of the direct steamship service. The Patriot's attitude in the present case is not likely to materially injure Mr. Haszard or help any one else, whatever may have been the intention.

THE EDITOR'S MAIL.

McPherson Versus McLeod.

SIR,—In giving an account of the trial and the decision of the court in the case of McPherson vs McLeod you state at the end of your account "McPherson and his witnesses proved, which was not contradicted, that McLeod and his sons drove their cattle into McPherson's oats doing damage to the amount of about \$100."

Permit me to say that the statements in the above paragraph are not true. If I and my sons did what you allege we did you are not giving the judges of the court credit for much intelligence when they set the verdict aside. The verdict was set aside because McPherson threw down McLeod's fence thereby allowing the cattle into McPherson's grain, and because there was no evidence that McLeod and his sons drove the cattle into the oats. The amount of the damages was assessed by the Jury at \$10 and if McPherson and his witnesses swore that it was \$100 then it can be seen that McPherson and his witnesses were not believed by the jury.

PRISON

100 Men Shut in a Colorado Mine

TWENTY-TWO ARE DEAD

Every Effort at Rescue Proves Futile—Probably all Perished.

IMPRISONED BY FIRE.

TALLULURIE, Colorado, Nov. 21 (Special).—Nearly a hundred men are probably suffocated in the Smuggler's Union Mine in Marshall Basin by a fire that burned the building at the mouth of the tunnel.

TWO HUNDRED MEN WENT IN.

Twenty two are known to be dead and scores of others are believed to be dead or seeking safety in remote sections.

Nearly two hundred men had gone into the mine before the fire broke out, but some escaped.

FRUITLESS EFFORTS AT RESCUE.

Every effort is now being made to reach the imprisoned men, but the fear is that all must have perished.

THE latest news last night from the smallpox patient in the Marine Hospital at Keppoh was that his case is a serious one. He is being nursed by Mr. Ploton Brown who nobly volunteered his services. The patient had requested to see a Methodist minister, and yesterday afternoon, after consulting with his Church Board, Rev. G. M. Young visited him in company with Dr. Conroy, the quarantine physician. As there were no accommodations for Mr. Young at the Hospital, he was permitted by Dr. Johnson, the Health Officer, to return to his home, where he is isolated from his family in the upper flat of the parsonage in strict quarantine. Mr. McDonald of Georgetown, who first nursed the patient, has returned on board the vessel. Dr. Conroy yesterday re-vaccinated four men of the crew who had been unsuccessfully vaccinated before. The vessel will be fumigated today. The above are the actual facts of the case. All possible precaution is being taken to prevent the spread of the disease and there is thus no cause whatever for alarm.

THE special jubilee services in St. Dunstan's Cathedral were completed yesterday, and a number of the country clergymen who have been assisting the Cathedral staff returned to their respective parishes. Jubilees are a long established practice in the Roman Catholic church and are held at stated intervals, usually of fifty years. The present one to commemorate the advent of the twentieth century has been held in every part of the world during the past year. The conditions of the jubilee are that each person make sixty individual visits to a church where the Blessed Sacrament is kept, or eight visits made in procession and four made individually, a worthy confession and communion, and other good works and prayers. A plenary indulgence is granted for the faithful performance of these duties. In most of the parishes, in the Island the visits were made in the procession. Two processions of this kind took place at the Cathedral this summer. In cities where there were more than one Roman Catholic church, the procession took place to and from the different churches.

THE spacious basement of the First Methodist church was filled with an interested and appreciative audience last night to hear the efforts of the young ladies who were competing for the Demorest Medal. These contests are conducted by the W. C. T. U. of the city and last night's recital was the first of the second contest, each of which consists of five or six competitors when a silver medal is awarded, when the winners again compete for a gold medal which completes a contest. The object is not the mere winning of a medal, desirable as that may be and is, the primary object being the defusion of temperance literature and the teaching of temperance. The young Ladies of the Y's are to be commended for their efforts in this regard, as well as for providing from time to time an evening's entertainment of a very high order. The contestants of last night each and all gave a good account of themselves and no doubt some of them will be heard from in competitions of this kind at some future time. Miss Maggie Gillies was the winner on this occasion, and she was heartily applauded when the fact was announced by the chairman. The Judges were Misses McMurray, McIntyre, and Dutcher, teachers of Prince Street School. The task of adjudging the medal under existing circumstances is by no means an enviable one and much praise is due the ones who are willing to brave public opinion to help on a good cause. An excellent program was carried out and where all did so well it would be invidious to particularize. Prof. Watts and his Orchestra gave several selections and aided in no small degree in the evening's enjoyment. The room was tastefully decorated with bunting flags, etc. and the platform was gay with blooming plants. Excellent home-made candy was offered for sale and was eagerly bought by the audience. Rev. D. B. McLeod discharged the duties of chairman in his usual good style. The National Anthem closed a well spent evening. The competitors were—Nettie Stanley, Bella Ramsay, Maggie Gillis, Daisy Gardner, E. Hel Witlock, Uzilia Williams.


ENCOURAGING.—A young man who has been living in this city only a few months but who has manifested considerable interest in the work of the Young Men's Christian Association, called at the Association yesterday and expressed his interest in what was being done, and subscribed twenty-five dollars towards the funds of the institution.
