FARM HINTS FOR PROVINCIALISTS

Fowls need a variety of food to keep their appetites in good condition. Feed grain separately at different times during the day in clean litter, with meat scraps boiled and mixed with middlings and bran, also of green cut corn and green feed, in the form of cabbage, potatoes, lettuce, when in season, or green food, some kind is of the utmost importance to the well being of the fowl, mangels and beets are also an excellent green food for poultry. Oyster shell, grit and charcoal are necessary to the health of the birds and should be kept before them all the time. Charcoal is a necessity as a corrective and is a means of keeping their digestive organs in good condition and prevent diarrhoea.

For the health of the fowl, no poultry house should be too tightly closed at night, as some allowance should always be made for a liberal supply of fresh, pure air. The most essential feature is to provide a plentiful supply of fresh and pure air at all times, without draught, and this can be done by having unbleached muslin screens substituted for a part of the glass in the south front of the upper half of the window frame. In this way an abundance of fresh air can be supplied without danger from draught. Sunshine is one of the best purifiers and disinfectants and all poultry houses should be so arranged as to admit an abundance of sunlight to the interior of the house whenever the sun shines.

It will soon be time to place the poultry in winter quarters, so that it is now the time to clean out the poultry house. Take everything out of the house, including roosts, dropping boards and nests; brush the cobwebs down and clean out the houses thoroughly; spray the house inside, either with a strong solution of carbolic acid or whitewash; take a pail partly filled with red-hot coals, place in the center of the hen-house, and put some sulphur on the coals; close the doors and windows tightly, and leave them closed for a day or two, and there will not be a house or a mite living in that house at the end of that time, providing plenty of sulphur is used and the house is sprayed thoroughly previous. It would be a good plan to have new nest boxes, or if one cannot afford new ones, be sure to cleanse the old ones thoroughly before replacing them.

The following is a brief outline of how the butter I exhibited at Toronto Exhibition, and which won second prize was made. At that time we were milking six grade Shorthorn cows. We use the De Laval Cream Separator.

After the milk was separated, the cream was placed in cold water and stirred until it was usually left the cream until the next milking before adding to the stock on hand. We were four days gathering the amount of cream required. We always strive to have enough cream for churning to make the amount of butter required for each section, so as to be assured of even setting and coloring.

We did not use a starter, but kept the cream at a temperature sufficient to ripen it soon enough for the purpose. It was left twelve hours to ripen after the last supply of sweet cream had been added.

Before churning, the churn was first scalded with boiling water and then rinsed with cold water. The cream was put in at a temperature of 60 degrees and churned for three-quarters of an hour. As soon as the butter was in small grains, the butter-milk was drained off and the butter washed with plenty of cold water, usually four pails, or enough to make the water come off clear.

We used one-half an ounce of salt to a pound of butter, allowing a couple of ounces to each churning for waste. We use this amount of salt regularly in making butter for packing in crocks. For pound prints we use three-quarters of an ounce to a pound of butter. We work the butter three times.—Mrs. J. T. Hancock, Ontario Co., Ont.

In Prince Edward Island the production of creamery butter in 1900 was 562,220 lbs., valued at \$118,402. In 1907 the quantity was only 358,422 lbs. valued at \$89,339.

G. A. Gilroy, the well-known Holstein breeder, of Leeds County, told a representative of the Canadian Dairyman and Farming World recently that he was inclined to believe that it pays to milk three times a day. He stated that last spring he had been milking his cattle three times a day.

When the busy season came on, he milked them only twice a day, with the result that their milk production fell off almost one-third. He did not think that the loss was due entirely to the fact that they were milked only twice a day, as the pastures were not as good at that time that they were milked twice a day, but he thought that a good deal of the shrinkage was due to their being milked only twice instead of three times a day.

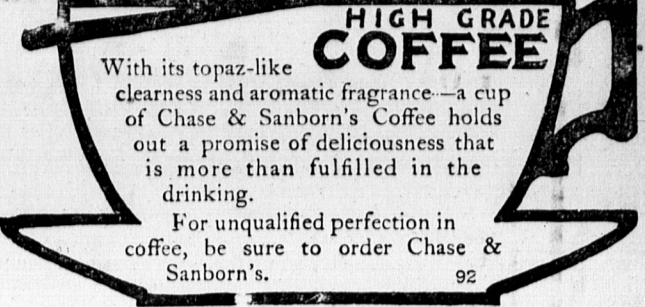
