**Hon. G. Faulkner Honored by Commercial Travellers**

Forty years as secretary of the Maritime Commercial Travellers Association were recognized when Hon. George E. Faulkner was specially honored by an address and a presentation of a purse of gold by the members of the Association at the annual meeting of the organization held in the Board of Trade rooms, Halifax, Friday night.

Major James Pringle of Fredericton was elected president of the association for the year 1928.

The vice presidents are as follows: For Nova Scotia, Ralph K. Kelley; for New Brunswick, John W. Dobbins; for P. E. I., M. P. Titus. The forty-sixth annual report showed that the organization has now a membership of 1595, of whom 908 are registered in Halifax, and 687 at Saint John.

The statement of the secretary-treasurer showed that the funds of the association now amounted to \$307,076.43, or an increase of \$19,368.79 for the year. Fifteen members of the association died during the year, of whom thirteen were entitled to Mortuary benefits.

The association was formed in the year 1882, according to its historical tabulated review in its annual report at which time it had 105 members, and resources of \$291.83. The event of the meeting was the recognition of the long years of service which Mr. Faulkner has given to the association. In the presentation the association found concrete means of expressing their appreciation of his services. Andrew MacKinlay, the oldest living past president, made the presentation, and it was observed during the course of the evening that Mr. MacKinlay was the son of A. K. MacKinlay, the first president of the association. It was also impressed upon the members present that during the tenure of office of Mr. Faulkner the resources of the association had increased from \$2,311.65 to over \$300,000 and membership from 172 to 1595.
