QUEBEC WOULD TAX INCOMING SETTLERS

QUEBEC, April 19.—The decision of the Quebec harbor commission to impose a tax of \$100 per adult immigrant and fifty cents per child, landing in this port this season, is not yet approved by Ottawa, where the shipping concerns and others interested will have the advantage of discussing the new regulations, it was learned today.

The object of the tax is to help the Quebec harbor commission to defray the expenditures which are growing more and more. A few weeks ago, after discussing the matter, the commissioners decided that the tax was justified. They studied the system adopted in several European ports and also the fact that in the United States a head tax of \$8 is collected from immigrants. The tax of \$1—imposed by Quebec will have no effect on the intending immigrants and certainly we should be allowed to profit.

"As to the charge that it may discriminate against the port of Quebec," one commissioner stated, "it is not founded as such a small tax can have no effect."
