*Mr. Richard Creed held an agricultural conference in the Hall at Uigg on Tuesday, the 16th inst. There was quite a large number of farmers present. Mr. John S. Martin, M. D. A., occupied the chair. Mr. Creed dealt very largely on the dairy situation as it is now on P. E. Island. He pointed out in the year 1913 \$161,702 worth of dairy products was imported into the United Kingdom, and that a large amount of this was cheese which came from countries which are now of a belligerent nature, and cannot show these amounts for some time to come. He then went on to show that Belgium imported to a large extent the food for her dairy cattle especially concentrates. He pointed out that our farmers would be making good financing by selling some of their oats and buying some of the concentrates for the cattle, and try to supply the shortage of oats which the United Kingdom is likely to suffer. A discussion then followed in which Messrs. Martin, McLeod, McPherson and Campbell and others took part. The Dairy Industry of Prince Edward Island will come up for further discussion on Monday next, and everyone interested should make it a point to be present.
