The war brings us a multiplicity of strange names of persons and places. Doubtless many readers get confused in reading them and can sympathise with the old gentleman pictured in Punch, who is made to say, "If it weren't that Kuropatkin, the general of the tall soldiers, has the long name, and Kuroki, the general of the short soldiers has the short name, I should never be able to remember which was which."

The full report of Mr. Hazzard's maiden speech in the House of Commons during the budget debate is now to hand, and we agree with The Patriot that it does him credit. It is the speech of a party man, no doubt, but it is moderate in tone and contains no word that could give offence to any on the other side of the House. The speech is full of information regarding our trade and trade relations, and the present conditions commercially in Canada and the Mother Country. Mr. Hazzard sees that Canada is prospering abundantly and he does not share the views of those who believe that Britain is going to the dogs for want of higher protection. He evidently thinks the Canadian tariff quite high enough, as we do, and will be glad to see the day when the duties on some articles now imported largely and used of necessity by the many shall be further reduced. Mr. Hazzard is well versed in matters affecting our trade and industry. He has spoken his views with frankness and clearness, and his speech will, we think find general approval among the people of Prince Edward Island whom he represents.

Let us suppose a case in parallel with that of Lord Dunsford. Let us assume that the inspectors and teachers gave a banquet to the Chief Superintendent of Education, and that the Chief in addressing his entertainers told them that the Provincial Ministers had persistently ruled against the true interests of education and had interfered with him in an "intolerable" manner. How long could he reasonably expect to retain his office?

Drummond, President of the Bank of Montreal to be Knight Commander of the order of St. Michael and St. George; to be Knight Bachelor, Hugh Montague Allan, of the Allan S. S. Line, Montreal; to be Companions of the Imperial Service Order, Mr. Gobel, Deputy Minister of Public Works; John Robert Wallace, Asst. Receiver-General, Department of Finance; A. A. Boucher, Asst. Master in Chancery; Senator David, Montreal; D. Pottinger, General Manager Intercolonial Railway, Halifax.

We have received from the author, Watson Griffin, editor of Industrial Canada, a neat little illustrated book entitled Protection and Prices and the Farmer's Home Market. In brief it is a reasoned campaign argument in favour of a new tariff giving higher protection to Canadian industries. How determinedly the protection campaign is being urged is shown in the statement of Mr. Griffin that the first edition of his little book reached a circulation of 78,000 copies and twenty thousand of the second edition have been already sold, while in addition he has sent out about a million small pamphlets in favor of protection during the past year.


