HERRING fishing in New London bay is being prosecuted with vigor and we have heard of some good catches already.

## ISLANDER ARRESTED

### Charged With Setting A Blaze

### ARRESTED N. GLASGOW

### Supposed that Accused is a Sneak Thief and Upset a Lamp

The Pictou Advocate of 3rd, says: Last Saturday evening an alarm of fire was sounded for a blaze in the residence of James W. Hogg, but the services of the fireman were hardly necessary, and little damage was done. The fire was caused by a lamp having been upset. The house was supposed to have been vacant at the time. Mrs. Hogg had crossed the street to speak with her neighbor, Mrs. Hutson, and had been there only a few minutes when the cry of fire caused her to return. It was at once apparent that a sneak thief had been in the house and had upset the lamp, hastily departed, because some articles foreign to the house were found there, while some clothing was missing. The case was placed in charge of Police-man Carroll, whose fame as a detective has already gone abroad, and yesterday he arrested in New Glasgow the party he has reason to believe is guilty of this and other thefts, because the articles found at Mr. Hogg's were taken from the house of Mrs. Simpson, Battery Hill, and Wm. Cole, on High St., two thefts Carroll had previously learned of. The man charged with the crime is a P. E. Islander, and will be examined to-morrow.
