A HORSE SCARCITY.

Under this heading the editor of the
Canadian Farm points out that the
horse situation has improved wonder-
fully and that in the next few years
the price of horses is liable to advance
very rapidly. At the annual meeting
of the National Live Stock Records
Board held in Ottawa last week the
Live Stock Records Board held in Ot-
tawa last week the Live Stock Com-
missioner stated that over 60,000
horses had been taken out of Canada
since the war began. The drain in the
United States has been even greater
and today there is a demand for heavy
horses in that country that cannot be
supplied. Only the other day there
were nine American buyers looking
for horses and there is a very keen de-
mand for heavy horses of the right
type and quality and he suggests
that this is the situation today and in
two or three years it will be very
much more so. In this Province the
price of horses has been so low that
farmers are inclined to stop breeding,
but this evidently will be a mistake.
It was clear that with many horses
being used up for war purposes the
time must come when a scarcity would
be felt but it was not expected that
a shortage would come so soon. The
advice to horse breeders is to breed
all the heavy horses they can of the
best quality.
