BOGART TOUGH, COMPELLING IN "KNOCK ON ANY DOOR"

Sometimes tender, sometimes shocking and at all times compelling, Columbia Pictures' "Knock on Any Door," which stars Humphrey Bogart at the Prince Edward Theatre, is the challenging record of a Skid Row killer who wants to live fast, die young, and have a good looking corpse. Based upon Willard Motley's best-selling novel of big city crime and passion, "Knock on Any Door" has been filmed with the brutal honesty and profound compassion to be found in the book itself.

The story of Nick Romano, a sensitive youngster who dreams of stars and stumbles into a gutter, the Columbia drama traces his inevitable gineproation. He knows all the angles, loves all the girls, hates all the cops—and his efforts to escape from his Skid Row surroundings into a decent, normal world grow increasingly weaker under the pressure of his environment. The end of "Pretty Boy" Romano's trail is as grim and spellbinding as is his life.

In major featured roles are George Macready, as a ruthless District Attorney determined to send a "cop-killer" to the chair; petite and lovely Allene Roberts as Emma, the lost girl from anywhere who married for love and found disillusion; and Susan Perry, as a social worker who tries with Bogart to smash Skid Row's tenacious grip on Nick Romano. Other unforgettable characters of the novel are brilliantly cast and portrayed.

The Lavandier Fur Farm in Georgetown operated by two brothers Frank Lavandier and Raymond Lavandier recently signed a five year contract with the Dominion Government for the operation of an experimental mink station. In the mink ranching business for years the Lavandier Fur Farm is well equipped and experienced to carry on this experimental work. Twenty female breeders and ten males will comprise the stock for the experiments in feeding and breeding to be carried out. The mink stocked will be all of the Standard type, that is the natural dark color mink, and will be selected from the present stock on the ranch. It is understood that in addition to the breeding shed already on the premises and which will be used to house the selected breeding stock, that a new furring shed and a food preparing and storage house will be constructed. In addition to carrying out the specified Government experiments in feeding, breeding and record keeping, the two brothers will continue to maintain their own private ranch of Standard, Silverblu and Pastel mink.

A meeting of the Mayor and Council and the Building Committee of the Community Welfare League was held in the council chambers on Wednesday night.
