Sarnia Murder Case Continues

SARNIA, Ont., Jan. 30 - (CP) - Evidence given today at the trial of 26-year-old Joseph Taylor charged with murder in the kitchen chair slaying of his 25-year-old wife Rita, was that the Taylor went out visiting in company of a friend, Harry Holmes, on the eve of the woman's death.

Police said Mrs. Taylor was found unconscious in the early hours of Nov. 30 in the kitchen chair and her husband occupied at suburban Baxter's Beach. She appeared to have been badly beaten. A few hours later she died in hospital without regaining consciousness.

Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Downie told the court Mr. and Mrs. Taylor and Holmes were at the Downie home on the night in question. They said the Taylor's appeared on the terms with each other. The Downies said the visitors each drank two bottles of beer and took away with them a bottle apiece.

Hitler Tied-up German Grand Fleet In 1943

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Jan. 30 - Adolf Hitler, in a fit of anger, ordered the German High Seas Fleet laid up in January, 1943, almost two years before the end of the war.

It was disclosed in secret Nazi documents made public here and in London tonight. A heavy fleet of British warships, reinforced from time to time by American battleships, cruisers and destroyers, maintained ceaseless patrol in the North Sea between Britain and Norway, unaware that their quarry had been immobilized.

That this heavy fleet was not entirely wasted watching the laid-up German fleet was shown by the desperate northern raid of the Scharnhorst in December, 1943. Although scheduled to be decommissioned by Hitler July 1, naval officers apparently succeeded in postponing the end of their last crack fighting ship. She was caught by British units and destroyed while running for home.

Another long-kept secret also came to light. Fleet Admiral Ernest King of the United States Navy usually revealed that the United States made plans before the war to seize the Portuguese Azores with the unofficial approval of Portugal.

Anticipating a German grab for the strategic islands located in mid-Atlantic, the United States considered early in 1941 and then laid actual plans for occupying the Azores, as had been done with Iceland.

Since Portugal was neutral, "sub-rosa" conversations with U. S. representatives agreed to the occupation, but arranged for an official "pact" to be drawn up. The pact was never signed.

The Nazi documents show a three-pronged attack in 1943 - among the air force, army and navy - ended with Hitler ordering his new chiefs for leaving their ships while in the docks, utterly useless like so much old iron.

He topped off a series of violent conferences with a flat order that decommissioned every ship in the German navy larger than a destroyer.

The documents stressed that Germany did not think she would have to fight Britain at least not for about five years after the outbreak of war in 1939. A big German navy was planned and would be ready to attack British forces until 1944 or 1945, the document showed.
